Senate Approves Security Payroll

WASHINGTON, May 16.—(AP)—The senate approved today, and returned back to the house for action on amendments, a resolution appropriating \$4,000,000 for the social security board to finance administrative grants to the states. Senator Adams (D., Colo.), said the money was needed to meet personnel expenses of the state boards from May 15 to July 1, previous appropriations for this fiscal year having been exhausted. The house approved a \$2,500,000 appropriation.
