## Victory Dinner This Evening

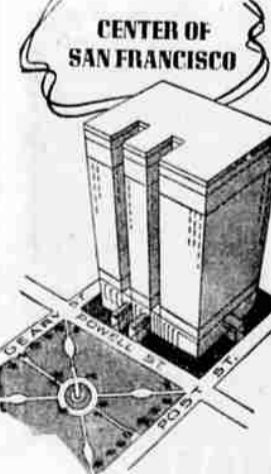
