Regarding the gubernatorial race, our advice has been for all voters who PREFER Governor Martin to SO EXPRESS THEMSELVES at the polls,—Democrats mark his name, Republicans write it in and place a cross before it.

But the voter in the Republican primary who doesn't prefer Martin, and is at a loss as to which Republican candidate to select we would unhesitatingly recommend Charley Sprague.

who in the line of his duty as Circuit Judge handed down an opinion the radical labor leaders didn't like—and they are out to "get" him.

WE can imagine nothing WORSE for the cause of a non-political, independent judiciary, in this state, than that this effort should be successful.

For if a labor minority can "GET" a Supreme Court judge, because he refuses to yield to its political dictation, any disgruntled minority can do the same thing,—and then there is your independent, non-political judiciary!

It has gone where the woodbine twined,— For nothing in creation could then prevent our Supreme Court from eventually becoming an out-and-out partisan political organization,—for any independent, courageous, conscientious judge like Judge Lusk would only last until the next election!

Certainly no right thinking citizen in the state wants that,—or anything approaching it. The way to prevent it is to vote for: Hall S. Lusk, J.-O. Bailey, and Henry J. Bean, the present incumbents.

Now that the distinction of having had a major operation for appendicitis or gall stones has largely vanished, says Oren C. Durham, botanist, in his book "Your Hay Fever" (Bobbs-Merrill), it is becoming fashionable to boast of having had "one hundred and fifty skin tests right here on my arm and they found I was sensitive to forty-seven different things."

That is not so hyperbolic as it may sound. When a doctor sets out to trace the specific cause of allergy or hypersensitivity to "some foreign protein," by the skin scratch test method, the investigation is only well under way when a hundred different protein extracts or allergens have been applied to a hundred scratches on the skin, and it would be remarkable if the patient did not react, that is, develop a little wheal or area of redness around the spot where three or four of the protein extracts have been applied.
