Can No Country Be Wrong?

ADMIRAL DECATUR'S famous saying, which has appeared at the masthead of the Chicago Tribune for many years—"My country right or wrong"—has a strong appeal, for the Portland Oregonian.

In an editorial today, it takes Jay Allen, well known Oregon war correspondent, to task for intimating such a slogan in the bunk.

RATHER disheartening for those who have believed the once reactionary Oregonian,—unlike the Chicago Tribune—had not only had its face lifted, but had created within itself a new viewpoint and a new spirit.

How does Stalin retain his power in Russia? Mussolini in Italy, Hitler in Germany? What is the essential philosophy that keeps the hard working peasants of Japan, shooting their yellow brothers, across the sea?

Obviously "Our country, right or wrong." Obviously a super-nationalism, an exaggerated patriotism,—a passion for one's country so strong, that no matter what course that country may take, it is approved.

The suppression of all human freedom, the denial of trial by jury, the eternal spying, the racial persecutions and tortures,—all the cruelty, inhumanity, and barbarism, of the present day,—all is justified in every country where it exists.

SO it is somewhat shocking to observe such an influential, enterprising and usually enlightened journal as the Oregonian, directly or indirectly commending it.

Under such an ideology, the greatest President this country ever had would never have reached the White House.

For as a congressman Abraham Lincoln had the temerity to oppose the Mexican war, condemned the administration for engaging in it, and as long as the war lasted refused to subscribe to it.

What's Wrong With Burbank? THERE must be something radically wrong with the Burbank (California) airport.

We haven't the official record at hand, but can recall in the past few years at least half a dozen fatal airplane crashes, within a hundred mile radius of the famous Union Air Terminal.

With the great advance in ship construction, and blind flying there would seem to be no excuse for one fatality after another, and all apparently due to the same cause,—mountains and poor visibility, near the airport.

The usual investigation of the fatal plane crash of Tuesday, with the loss of nine lives will be made by the usual federal committee, no doubt,—with a visit to the scene of the disaster only 30 miles from Burbank.

In the opinion of this column the investigation might better be made at the Union Terminal, with particular reference to the rules and regulations, which prevail regarding outgoing and incoming planes!

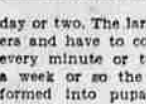

QUININE PROPHYLAXIS

The chief malaria-carrying mosquito in the United States is the species called Anopheles quadrimaculatus, generally a pond breeder. This mosquito may fly as far as a mile from its breeding place, even against the wind.



The incubation of malaria—the time elapsing from the moment of inoculation until the first symptoms develop—varies from ten days to as long as three months.
