SOUTHERN OREGON ORE MAY BE USED IN STEEL PLANT AT BONNEVILLE

WASHINGTON, May 20. - (AP) - A stainless steel manufacturing company at Baltimore filed the first industrial application for electrical energy from Bonneville dam, J. D. Ross, administrator of the Columbia river project, informed Senator Charles L. McNary yesterday.

Ross said the Maryland company proposed to establish a plant in Oregon. The application was for 15,000 kilowatts. Raw material would be obtained from deposits of iron ore and chrome in southern Oregon.

Ross said he would not oppose construction of factories in the Columbia river gorge provided they did not interfere with fish life and navigation and were designed in harmony with the scenery.

The steel plant would operate on the proposed switchboard rate of \$14.50 per kilowatt year for prime power and less for secondary and surplus power.

Goodrich Plants Closed By Strike

AKRON, Ohio, May 20. - (AP) - All Akron plants of the B. F. Goodrich Co. were closed today in a walkout which L. L. Callahan, president of Goodrich local, United Rubber Workers of America, said started as a protest against retention of eight apprentice electricians while men with longer service were being laid off.

"Now that we are out, we are going to demand a signed agreement, vacations with pay and the stopping of production work by supervisors and foremen," Callahan said.

CHINESE PLANES DROP PROPAGANDA LEAFLETS IN NIPPON TERRITORY

HANKOW, China, May 20. - (AP) - The Chinese crews of two big American-made (Martin) bombing planes were given a triumphal welcome today when they returned from what Chinese army aviation headquarters described as a flight over western Japan in which leaflets were dropped instead of bombs.

The airman were said to have covered 2,500 miles, the longest non-stop flight ever made by Chinese fliers. Their enthusiastic homecoming occurred at Hankow airbase, which presumably was their point of departure. The leaflets urged the Japanese people to oppose the invasion of China.

Premier H. H. Kung and War Minister General Ho Yung-Ching headed the delegation of Chinese leaders that greeted them on the return.

It was understood they visited principally the district containing Nagasaki, 470 miles from Shanghai, and Sasebo, the great naval base 40 miles to the north from which many of Japan's transports and warships put out for the China coast.
