

HURRIED CHECK-UP OF CHILD'S HEALTH HELD DETRIMENTAL

Adequacy Not Frequency Determines Value of Examinations in School, PTA Congress Told by Medic

SALT LAKE CITY, May 20. — (AP)—Hurried health examinations of children were yesterday termed more detrimental than beneficial by an executive of the American Medical Association.

"The importance of health check-ups is not the frequency but the adequacy," Dr. W. S. Bauer, Chicago, director of the A. M. A.'s bureau of health and public instruction told delegates to the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

"Hurried examinations are more detrimental than beneficial and most of them might better not be done," he advised.

"Economic conditions determine the amount and adequacy of medical care just as it determines everything else. The solution for school health programs is to pay school physicians well."

"The greatest problem in public health today is lack of adequately trained personnel," Dr. Bauer said. Dr. Bauer said the trend in public health had been toward greater extension of governmental activity, which he said along certain lines was necessary and desirable.

Upholds Private Practice
"The government has inescapable responsibilities toward the public health," he asserted.

"From an educational standpoint it is proper for health officials to interest themselves in pneumonia, syphilis, heart disease and cancer, but there are essentially personal problems and their treatment should remain in the hands of the private practicing physician."

"More money than ever before is available for public health development in the United States today."

Favor Sex Education
"The money available is being used by officials in accordance with their judgment. With some of this judgment the medical profession is not in agreement. The medical profession still holds that the treatment of the sick and a large proportion of preventive medicine belong in the hands of the practicing physician."

Alma Zillmer of Madison, Wis., told the congress sex education should have a definite place in the school curriculum as well as in the home.

"Young people," she said, "are sadly in need of intelligent advice along the lines of social hygiene."

Dr. Ada Hart Arlitt of Cincinnati supported Miss Zillmer in her assertion, children's curiosity about sex should be satisfied.

"Such curiosity is normal and should be encouraged," she said. "But the information they desire should be obtained in a scientific way at home and school instead of from cheap magazines and movies."
