

HOPE IS RETAINED FOR ENTIRE QUOTA OF HIGHWAY FUNDS

Repeated Changes in Congress Bill Befuddle Oregon Officials — Program Waits Congress Action

By PAUL W. HARVEY, Jr. SALEM, May 20.—(AP)—Congress has changed the federal highway appropriation bill for 1938-41 so many times that state highway department officials don't know where they stand, but they still hope that Oregon will get its full quota of \$4,276,000 per year.

This amount includes regular federal aid funds, which the state matches, as well as farm-to-market roads, rural free delivery roads, school bus routes, forest roads and federal land roads.

The highway department first became worried when President Roosevelt asked congress to curtail road money. Highway engineers over the country raised such a storm of protest that the house refused to heed the president's recommendation.

Roosevelt for Plan When President Roosevelt announced his new spending program to end the business recession, he asked that the full road appropriation be authorized, pointing out that highway construction would keep many men at work.

The house passed the appropriation bill, but a senate committee reduced the amount. The smaller sum would cut Oregon's share to \$3,000,000. If the bill passes the senate as now written, a senate-house conference committee might restore the full amount.

But at any rate, there is not much chance that Oregon's share of federal road funds would be reduced. If the federal road bills give the state \$3,000,000 a year, relief appropriations probably would make up the difference.

The state highway department, anxious to plan its road construction program, wishes congress would make up its mind in a hurry.

Easterners Oppose The principal opposition to the road appropriations comes from eastern congressmen, who can't see why Oregon and other western states get larger federal road grants per capita than eastern states.

Rep. James W. Mott (R., Ore.) explained it in an address in the house of representatives two weeks ago.

"Some of my eastern friends have expressed surprise that my own state of Oregon, for example, with a population of only 1,000,000 should be entitled to receive, and will receive from the appropriation bill passed last month and this authorization bill, \$4,276,000 per year in federal road money for the fiscal years 1939, 1940 and 1941," Mott said.

"The reason for this is that although my state has only 1,000,000 people, it has a road mileage as great as that of some of the thickly populated eastern states of smaller size and that 54 per cent of the area of my state belongs to the federal government."

"This government-owned area consists of national forests, a national park, the Oregon and California grant lands, Indian reservations and the unappropriated public domain. It is entirely proper and equitable that upon government-owned land, the government should pay the whole cost of building roads."

Governor Martin was a new man Wednesday morning, after he delivered a blistering radio address attacking supporters of Henry L. Heas, his opponent for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in today's election.

"I feel good today after that speech," the governor said. "While I was holding back I didn't feel right, because I was trained to fight, and there's nothing better than I enjoy than a good fight. I guess my army training made me feel this way."

The reporters stalked out of his office, sorry that all was "off the record."

Political observers can't remember a campaign as turbulent as the one which ended today, in which the national administration was involved in the fight for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination between Martin and Heas.

Until the last week labor appeared to be the dominant issue, but this issue was doubled when secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes and Senator George W. Norris (Ind., Neb.) criticized Martin.

The campaign closed with the administration endorsing no one, James A. Farley, Democratic national chairman, giving assurance that the administration would take no part in primaries in any state except Pennsylvania.

Governor Martin, who said in his speech Tuesday night that John L. Lewis of the CIO was waging a battle for political control of Oregon by endorsing Heas, had no comment on the result in Pennsylvania, where Lewis candidates were defeated.

By Mrs. Alexander George Company for Supper Serving Six Frozen Fruit Salad Waters Cheese Casserole Spiced Peas Buttered Cauliflower Rolls Plum Jelly Vanilla Ice Cream Caramel Sauce Sponge Cake Coffee Frozen Fruit Salad 1 cup diced pineapple 1 cup diced peaches 1 cup diced pears 1 cup mayonnaise 1 cup whipped cream 2 tablespoons lemon juice 2 ingredients and freeze for four hours in a tray in the mechanical refrigerator. This salad may also be frozen by packing it tightly in a mold, covering and burying it for four hours in five parts of chopped ice and one part of coarse salt. Serve the salad on crisp lettuce and top with more mayonnaise. Cheese Casserole (With Mushrooms) 4 tablespoons butter

1-3 cup flour 1/2 teaspoon salt 1-3 teaspoon paprika 1-3 teaspoon celery salt 1 teaspoon minced onions 1 tablespoon chopped pimientos 1 tablespoon chopped parsley 3 cups milk 1 cup grated cheese 1 cup browned mushrooms 3 egg yolks 3 egg whites, beaten

Melt butter and add flour. Mix and add seasonings and milk. Cook slowly and stir constantly until a creamy sauce forms. Add cheese, mushrooms and yolks. Beat two minutes. Fold in whites.
