GRANT IS SECOND AND SALEM THIRD; MEDFORD IN RUCK

Beaverton Boy Plods To New State Record 440—Bend Entrant Breaks 880-Yard Mark In 2:00.9

CORVALLIS, May 21.—(AP)—Bend high school athletes scored 37 points today to place first in the 12th annual state track and field meet and retain their Oregon championship, won last year.

Grant high school of Portland was second with 20 points and Salem third with 19.

Close behind the leaders was Forest Grove with 15 points, of which 14 were collected by Francis Schultz, high point man of the meet. Dickson of Bend scored 13 points and Hallway of Washington high school, Portland, 8 1/2.

The old state record of 512 seconds in the 440, set in 1935 by Schriver of Jefferson Hi, Portland, and tied by Jenkins of Athens in yesterday's preliminaries, tumbled today when Al Karpestein of Beaverton stepped the distance in 50 seconds flat.

New 880-Yard Mark

Willie Nelson, Bend, broke the 880-yard record with a time of 2:00.9. The old mark of 2:01.5 was set by McGaughey of Roseburg in 1933.

Hurdle race marks set in yesterday's preliminaries for new conditions were lowered today. Hallway of Washington flipped the high stakes in 1:4.9 and McKee of Pendleton the low in 23 seconds flat.

Salem's relay team came from behind to place second and clinch third place for the Vikings who already had won the 100-yard dash, discus, mile, pole vault and 220.

Trojans Fire Star Runner On Eve Of Two Big Meets

LOS ANGELES, May 21.—(AP)—University of Southern California athletic heads fired their star distance runner, Louis Zamperini, from the track team today in drastic punishment for his failure to compete in the Compton invitational track meet last night.

The action, depriving the undefeated Trojans of a consistent point scorer as they prepared to go into the Pacific Coast conference, intercollegiate A. A. A. and N. C. A. A. meets during the coming weeks, was taken on the grounds that Zamperini had failed to cooperate as a member of the squad.

The university took no official cognizance of accusations made by Herschel Smith, manager of the Compton meet, that Zamperini had demanded—and been refused—"exorbitant expense money" a scant few hours before the meet last night.

The 20-year-old sophomore, a member of the American Olympic games team in 1936 and the fastest miler ever developed on the west coast, was slated to run against Don Leah, former Indiana ace, in the feature attraction of last night's meet.

His non-appearance was a blow to the 6,000 present, many of whom had come from "King Louis's" nearby home town of Terrace to see their idol race against Leah.

Zamperini remained unavailable to interviewers.

BRITT, CHICK MATCH CLAIMS INTEREST OF GRAPPLING ADDICTS
