## SIX OF CUP TEAM SURVIVE SECOND ROUND AT TROON

### Yates Beats Fischer While Goodman Takes Billows in British Amateur Golf Championship Tourney

TROON, Scotland, May 24.—(AP)—Charley Yates of Atlanta beat Johnny Fischer of Cincinnati on a stymie at the nineteenth hole and U. S. champion Johnny Goodman scrambled home to beat Ray Billows of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., 4 and 2, today as six United States Walker cup players survived the second day's competition in the British amateur golf championship.

Aside from Fischer and Billows, the only American to be defeated was Marvin (Bud) Ward of Olympia Wash. The young coast golfer came from behind to the Albert W. Briscoe be-spectacled Irish internationalist on the home green, then lost on the twentieth as Briscoe canned a 10-footer for a birdie 3.

Goodman's triumph in a re-play of last year's American championship final put him in the third round together with Walker cup captain Francis Coulter and Charles (Chuck) Koonce of Detroit. Yates, on his victory over Fischer, went into the second round together with Fred Haas, Jr., of New Orleans, who scored an easy triumph today, and Reynolds Smith of Dallas, victor in the first-round match yesterday.

Outmet came through with a 4 and 3 decision over Dr. William Tweedell, captain of the 1936 British Davis cup team; Koonce ran up an early margin, then held on to beat William Pascoe of Britain, 3 and 2, and Haas breezed to a 7 and 6 decision over A. J. Ashworth of Scotland.

Into the third round with the three Americans went two other favorites, Gordon Peters of Scotland, British Walker cupper who beat Victor G. L. Finlayson, 6 and 4, and C. Ross (Sandy) Somerville, Canadian champion and former U. S. titleholder, who whipped A. W. Ogilvie of South Africa, 7 and 5.

Billy Hulen says: Tiger Athletes End Best Year In Sport Books

Medford high school's 1937-38 athletic season was ended with the Oregon track and field meet at Corvallis Saturday, and while the Tigers didn't

cop any state championships in football, basketball and baseball, the major sports, they did right well by themselves in southern Oregon. In fact, you could name the past year as one of the most successful ever enjoyed by Red and Black clad athletes and by far the best since Coach Bill Bowerman took over the reins in the fall of 1935.

Competing in the three major sports, the Tigers made a clean sweep to win the conference or district title in each. The Black Tornado after a rather slow start, generated terrific

power in the closing stages to win the football championship of the Southern Oregon conference without the loss of a game. Grants Pass and Ashland were beaten and Klamath Falls tied in conference action.

In basketball, the Tigers didn't win the conference pennant, but they did grab the district 9 flag and right to enter the state tournament, a far more important honor than the conference championship. It was a grueling battle down the stretch with Ashland, but Bowerman's cabin stood up stoutly. At the state tournament, the Medfords were just a little out of their class, but with a sophomore team they didn't figure to make a serious bid. Next year, those sophomores will be juniors and seasoned in the fire of competition, and maybe many things will happen.

The Tiger track and field team was away ahead of its southern Oregon rivals, winning two dual meets from Grants Pass by overwhelming scores, grabbing the Southern Oregon title by a huge margin from 20 other schools, including Klamath Falls, and showing the strongest prep teams west of the Cascades still it was done in the annual Bill Hayward relays at Eugene. In the state meet last Saturday, the Tigers were submerged under an avalanche of record and near-record breaking performances by Bend's mighty Lava Bears, Grant high of Portland and others.

Yes, this past season certainly produced plenty of hardware for the Tiger trophy case and we believe all those athletes, Head Coach Bowerman and assistants Russ Acheson and Ed Kirtley deserve a nice, big hand. Three championship out of three attempts is what we consider a pretty fair average.

Well, our high-powered Craters have seen three Southern Oregon league ball clubs, and as yet the team hasn't made itself known which figures to seriously threaten a complete Medford domination of the pennant race. Ashland, Grants Pass and Crescent City don't appear to have the necessary pitching to halt the local "murderers' row," nor the hitting necessary to make things overly uncomfortable for Lowell Brown, Bill Patzke or Ray Erickson, the Crater mound staff. Yreka, Cal., the circuit's new entry, comes to town next Sunday, and with three straight losses in the same number of starts, Manager Wally Rickert is not losing any sleep over the fear the Californians will upset his outfit.

Perhaps Glendale's rough and tough Loggers are the gang the Craters will have to beat. They have probably better pitching, in Merle Johnson, than any team in the league with the exception of Medford. (Itself, Johnson is a slender righthander with words of stuff, but what that "stuff" will look like to McLean, Hafford, Rickert, Sakraida, Lewis, et al. is another question. We'll know June 5, when the Craters travel to the 'ogging town.

Although, on the face of things, Yreka doesn't appear to be dangerous, Manager Rickert is going to take no chances. He said Lowell Brown would too the rubber against them, and as the big southpaw is number one hurler now, because of his masterpiece Sunday against Crescent City, it is apparent the Crater skipper is leaving nothing to chance. Some

mighty funny things happen in baseball, sports and such, and it is entirely possible that Yreka may have a far better ball team than its record indicates.

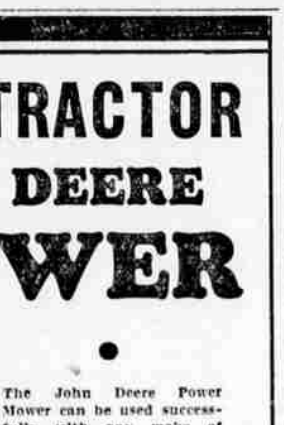
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
