HUMANE SOCIETY ISSUES WARNINGS

Southern Oregon Humane society today issued a warning on fox-tails and repeated a previous warning on raw fish. The season is now here when fox-tails are prevalent, and care should be exercised by owners of dog and cat pets. It was emphasized, the fox-tails get into the feet of dogs and cats going into fields and into the ears of long-eared dogs, the society pointed out. Unless they are removed, the fox-tails work their way into the bodies of the animals, causing great pain and sometimes death, the society cautioned. Owners of pets should be careful to remove the fox-tails, it was urged. Raw fish from all streams in southern Oregon is deadly poison for dogs, the society reminded the public.
