

BROCKWAY'S LEAD PLACED AT 174 IN UNOFFICIAL TOTAL

Complete Unofficial Figures Give Perry 385 Margin Over Allen in Commissioner Nomination Race

The complete unofficial count in the Republican race for sheriff gives A. E. Brockway of Orchard Home Drive, a lead of 174 over Rudy Stinger. Missing precincts checked late Monday gave Brockway a few more votes to increase his lead. Stinger ran surprisingly strong in both city and county.

In the only contested legislative seat, on either ticket, for state senator, George W. Dunn of Ashland polled 3,280 votes, against 888 votes for Ariel Burton Pomeroy of the Central point district.

INCUMBENTS WIN JUDICIARY RACE

Incumbent members of the state supreme court seeking re-nomination scored decisive majorities in the judicial election primary last Friday. Justice James O. Bailey received 4,978 votes, Justice Hall S. Lusk, 3,146, and Justice Henry J. Bean, 3,248 votes.

ASK ELIMINATION OF FIRE HAZARDS

With the advent of hot, dry weather Chief Roy Elliott issued another plea today for the cooperation of residents in eliminating fire hazards. All grass should be cut away from homes, garages and other buildings, removed to a safe place and burned under supervision, the chief said. Grass should be kept cut low throughout the summer, he counseled.

SECOND SPRAY DUE FOR MOTHS

Second cover spray for control of first brood codling moth on apples and pears should be completed by June 2, according to L. G. Gentner, entomologist of the Southern Oregon Experiment station and C. B. Cordy, assistant county agent.

In the few orchards where worms have not been a problem, use 3 lbs. arsenate of lead plus 1-3 to 1-4 pound of arsenic per 100 gallons. The average orchard should use 2 lbs. arsenate of lead, 1/2 gallon of light medium or medium summer oil emulsion, plus 1/2 pound of spreader. This combination costs very little more than straight lead and is very much more effective.

For apples use light oil in the above combination. Where trees are to be banded with chemically treated bands, these bands should be in place by June 15.

FARMER AND WIFE SUE FABERS FOR SMASHUP DAMAGE

R. Edwards, farmer of the Phoenix district, filed suit yesterday for \$10,000 damages, \$400 for two months loss of labor, \$250 physician's services and \$84.50 hospital fees, against Everett A. Faber and Donald E. Faber, for alleged injuries sustained in an auto accident on the Klamath Falls highway March 22 last.

His wife, Minnie Edwards, also names the Fabers as defendants in a suit growing out of the same accident and seeks \$7800 general damages, and money paid for medical and hospital services.

Edwards alleges in his complaint he received injuries to his knee, which prevented him from laboring on his farm this spring. Mrs. Edwards alleges she sustained a fractured heel and other injuries.

The complaint alleges that the Faber truck was parked on the Klamath highway, without a warning light, and the auto driven by Edwards crashed into the rear of the truck, causing the asserted injuries. It was a dark and snowy night, the complaint says, and the truck was halted on account of mechanical trouble.

Attorneys Gus Newbury appears as counsel for the plaintiffs. Beale Lewis, in a complaint against Dr. R. W. Stearns, seeks \$16,000 damages for alleged mal-position of her right leg, after Dr. Stearns had treated it when it was fractured by a fall from a step-ladder on September 5, 1937.

The Portland law firm of W. P. Lord and T. Walter Gillard appear as plaintiff's counsel.

NIIPPON OFFENSIVE AGAINST RAILWAYS AIMS AT KAIFENG

Invaders' Planes Bomb Ancient Capital of Honan; Trackage, Ten Trains Destroyed, Is Claim of Japs

SHANGHAI, May 24.—(AP)—The Japanese offensive to choke all China's railways today rolled toward Kaifeng, ancient capital of Honan province and 40 miles east of the important junction at Chengchow. Japanese planes bombed Kaifeng in a morning attack and claimed destruction of ten trains and considerable trackage. The station at Chengchow also was bombed, impeding communications east therefrom. Japanese artillery, tanks and cavalry were moving toward Kaifeng followed by infantry which captured the old city's key defenses at Lan-feng.

The nearest Japanese column was fighting its way along the Lunghai about Chaotzying, 18 miles east of Kaifeng.

(Hankow dispatches said several were killed at Kaifeng by aerial bombardment, and that the fighting a few miles east could be heard within the city).

By their capture of Suchow last week the Japanese broke the great east-west Lunghai railway at its junction with the north-south Tientsin-Pukow railway.

By taking Hainfeng and then Chengchow, 180 miles west of Su chow, the Japanese could cut the Lunghai's junction with the Peiping-Hankow line and facilitate an eventual drive toward Hankow itself where is maintained the temporary headquarters of China's Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's government.

The population of 250,000 mostly has evacuated Kaifeng.

TWO FINED \$25 FOR THEFT OF GASOLINE

PORTLAND, May 24.—(AP)—Milk production increased in April and prices dropped to the lowest level since 1934, a market survey said today. The May 1 milk production was about 8 percent higher than a year before and 4 percent above the earlier May 1 high in 1931.

FIVE MEET DEATH IN MOLTEN METAL

MIDLAND, Mich., May 24.—(AP)—Five persons were dead today from injuries suffered yesterday when they were showered with molten metal while conducting a test in the Dow Chemical company experimental laboratory.

The dead:
John E. Hoy, 53, experimental engineer; L. Fred Reynolds, 32, metallurgist; George Wiedemann, 41, assistant metallurgist; Philip Kryzminski, 27, laboratory worker, and Paul Parsons, 26, a machine operator.

Claire Harris, 29, a research worker, suffered severe burns but probably will recover. His clothes blazing, he plunged into a shower room and turned on the water.

The men were experimenting with a special metal. A company spokesman said a preliminary investigation indicated the vessel containing the molten metal apparently cracked in a sudden cooling contact.
