

PARADE TO OPEN DECORATION DAY OBSERVANCE HERE

March Starts Monday at City Park, at 9:30—Program Prepared for Annual Exercises in Park

The following program for Decoration Day, next Monday, was announced today by Col. W. H. Paine, general chairman:

A patriotic street parade will proceed at 9:30 a. m. from city park along Main street to Bear creek bridge where these exercises will be held.

Invocation by the Rev. E. S. Bartlam.

Strewing flowers in the water in honor of the memory of comrades who have sacrificed their lives for their country in its service on oceans, lakes and rivers.

Firing of a salute. Taps.

The procession will then return along Main street to city park where this program will be held:

Reading of orders, including General Logan's first Memorial Day general order.

Recitation of Lincoln's Gettysburg address by Burton Daugherty, Medford high school student.

Declaration of vacant chairs by representatives of veteran and patriotic organizations in honor of the memory of departed comrades.

Principal address by Dr. Sherman L. Divine.

Singing of "America" by the audience.

Benediction by the Rev. E. S. Bartlam.

Taps.

In case of inclement weather, the exercises will be held in the Presbyterian church.

All social, fraternal and civic betterment organizations of the community are invited to take part in the street parade. The general public is invited to attend the city park program.

Civil war veterans, Women's Relief Corps and the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War will conduct memorial exercises in the Medford L.O.O.F. cemetery at 2:30 p. m. All members of other veteran and patriotic organizations and the general public are invited to attend the ceremonies.

The annual Memorial Sunday services will be held in the English Zion Lutheran church on Fourth street near Oakdale avenue, at 11 a. m., May 29. The services will be conducted by the Rev. Werner Jensen. The public is invited, and all war veterans and members of patriotic societies are expected to be present.
