\$1,000 came to Oregon. What is needed here, he said, is concerted action to bring more tourists to Oregon and to effect completion of the new Pacific highway over the Siskiyou and the elimination of curves between Grants Pass and Roseburg.

To Stress Legendry Greater emphasis on the legendry of southern Oregon was proposed in a discussion led by Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue River national forest, John E. Doerr, Jr., naturalist of Crater Lake national park, and Prof. Irving Vining, conservationist of Ashland.

The meeting voted that publicity should include numerous southern Oregon attractions that have been more or less neglected. A motion was adopted creating the state highway commission for its advertisement of Crater Lake in a recent issue of a national magazine.

QUEEN MARY AT 71ST MILESTONE

LONDON, May 26.—(AP)—Dignified Queen Mother, Mary, reigning guardian of orthodoxy in Britain's royal family, is 71 years old today.

Batteries in Hyde Park boomed salutes, and public and private buildings hoisted flags, but Queen Mary's only celebration was a family luncheon party.

In the cream-walled dining room at Marlborough house, her red brick London home overlooking St. James park, Queen Mary headed a long table set with glittering silver plate. Flowers in pastel shades filled tall centerpiece and low surrounding bowls.

Among her first visitors were her grandchildren, 12-year-old Princess Elizabeth and her eight-year-old sister, Margaret Rose.

Edward, her favorite son, probably telephoned from France.

Caterpillar Horde Appears In Trees

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AFL ADHERENT LEADS IN TYPOS' VOTE FOR PRESIDENT OF UNION

INDIANAPOLIS, May 26.—(AP)—Charles P. Howard of Chicago, president of the International Typographical union, lagged far behind today in his race for re-election against his vice-president, Claude M. Baker of San Francisco.

Incomplete returns from 56 local unions gave Baker 12,593 and Howard 7594.

Union members admitted freely that the election brought to a climax internal strife between two factions. One favored American Federation of Labor policies and the other was for the committee for industrial organization, headed by John L. Lewis.

The ITU is affiliated with the AFL, and Howard, while president of the printers, became secretary of the CIO. He had criticized frequently AFL President William Green's policies.

PORTLAND, May 26.—(AP)—The Multnomah typographical union, local No. 58, voting in a nation-wide election for international president, gave Claude M. Baker, San Francisco, 229 votes to 123 for Charles Howard, incumbent.

A similar sentiment was expressed earlier in the day by H. A. Morgan, now TVA's chairman.

H. A. Morgan also told the committee that instead of forming a "coalition and conspiracy" against Chairman Morgan as the latter charged, the two directors had sought to prevent a one-man rule.

The former chairman, H. A. Morgan asserted, resented the actions of the other directors because "he was disabled from dictating all action and from exercising a veto power."
