DR. JAMES J. MILLER, VETERINARIAN OF CCC, IS CALLED BY DEATH

Dr. James J. Miller, 25, for the past year district veterinarian with the CCC headquarters here, died this morning at a local hospital following an emergency appendectomy.

Dr. Miller, a first lieutenant in the veterinary reserve, had been on duty as meat and food inspector for the district and apparently had been ill for some weeks but had not considered his condition serious. An emergency operation revealed a series of complications which brought about his death.

Dr. Miller had been making his home with his wife and year-old son, Charles, and had a wide circle of friends here. He was born October 31, 1912, and lived for a time in San Francisco before coming to Medford. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Miller, of Amber, Wash., were called here yesterday and with Mrs. Miller will take the body back to Amber, Wash., for burial. Capt. H. T. Gentle, CCC district surgeon, will accompany the body as military representative. Arrangements are being made by the Conger funeral home.
