

CANVASSING BOARD GIVES FIGURES ON LEGISLATIVE VOTE

Senator Dunn Received 3309 to 838 for Mrs. Pomeroy for Republican Senatorial Nomination.

The Jackson county legislative tickets, in the November general election, according to official counts completed by the canvassing board, will comprise on the Republican ticket State Senator George W. Dunn of Ashland for the senate, and E. T. Newby of Talent and Attorney William McAllister of Medford, for the house.

Senator Dunn, according to the official count, received 3,309 votes and his opponent, Ariel Burton Pomeroy of the Central Point district, 838.

McAllister was renominated with 2,736 votes, and Newby received 2,850 votes. Both were unopposed.

On the Democratic ticket, for representatives, R. O. Stephenson received 170 votes and W. H. McNair 100. Both were write-in candidates.

Stephenson, a former representative, declined to file for nomination.

4,403 for Hamilton Moore Hamilton, editor of the Medford News, unopposed, received the Democratic state senatorial nomination and polled 2,403 votes, the official count shows.

For other unopposed state offices, Emily Edson, Democratic candidate for secretary of state, polled 2,278 votes. Secretary of State Earl Snell, Republican candidate, received 4,140 votes. Charles A. Rice, unopposed Republican candidate for superintendent of public instruction, polled 3,397 votes.

The official count on the Republican ticket for county offices followed closely the unofficial count.

The Republican vote for justice of the peace (Medford district), official count, was Coleman 2,218, Jerome 811 (Ashland district), M. T. Burns 801, L. A. Roberts 431 (Jacksonville district), H. C. Mechem, unopposed, 187. There was no contest in the Gold Hill district.

For the Republican nomination for constable (Medford district), Nick Young, incumbent and unopposed, polled 2,289 votes. For county surveyor Paul B. Rynning polled 3,515 votes.

The official count on the Democratic ticket for county offices and "write ins" started today.

YATES WINS WAY TO FINAL ROUND OF BRITISH AMATEUR

Sole Remaining American Defeats Today and Tomorrow in Day's Play—Nine-Foot Putt Is Clincher

TROON, Scotland, May 27.—(AP)—Charley Yates of Atlanta today reached the final round of the British amateur golf championship by hanging on to gain a one-up victory in 19 holes over Hector Thomson of Scotland.

In tomorrow's 36-hole title match the cheerful American Walker, cup player will meet Cecil Ewing, giant Irishman who eliminated C. Ross (Sandy) Somerville of Canada, two up, in the other semi-final.

Yates, who had seen Thomson wipe out the three-hole lead he built up with a two-under-par 34 on the first nine, sank a nine-foot putt for a birdie on the 19th green for his victory.

Yates thus gained credit for eliminating the two only former champions left in the field. Thomson won the title two years ago while veteran Cyril Tooley, whom Charley put out in this morning's quarter-finals by 3 and 2, captured the title in 1920 and 1929.

The excitable southerner, who included an eagle 2 in his morning round to be out in 35, hit the turn in 34 this afternoon. He won the first hole by sinking an 18-footer, rammed home a beautiful 50-foot putt for another winning birdie at the sixth, then put his tee shot on the short eighth 20 feet away and sank that putt for a deuce and 3 up.

Short with his second, Charley dropped the tenth, and saw his lead out to one hole as Thomson canned a nine-footer for a 3 at No. 12. An eight-footer for a 4 at No. 15, where Yates was short again, put the Scot on even terms, and he went ahead for the first time on No. 17, where Yates sliced into the sand.

Charley then took the next two holes for the match. At the 18th, while Thomson got in trouble, Yates played two down the middle of the green, squaring the match with a par 4. On the first extra hole he came out of the rough, nine feet from the pin, with his second and, with Thomson only a foot short on his third, walked up and hit the ball into the center of the cup.

NOTED PHARMACOLOGIST PASSES UNEXPECTEDLY

BALTIMORE, May 27.—(P)—Dr. John Abel, whose researches brought relief to thousands previously doomed to misery and death, will be buried tomorrow beside his wife in Mountair Falls, N. Y.
