## VETERAN RANGER AT UNION CREEK ASKS RETIREMENT

Jesse P. DeWitt, Union Creek district ranger of the Rogue River National forest has applied for retirement because of ill health after 31 years with the United States forest service, headquarters announced yesterday. He will go on leave of absence Tuesday pending action in Washington, D. C., on his retirement application.  
If the application is sanctioned, Mr. DeWitt will be succeeded by Homer J. Dixon of Trout Lake, Wash., who will be promoted from assistant district ranger of the Columbia national forest, headquarters said.  
Mr. DeWitt entered the United States forest service as a guard on the Siskiyou national forest in June, 1907. He became a ranger in 1916 and was in charge of the Galice and Page Creek districts of the Siskiyou national forest before being transferred to the Rogue River national forest in March, 1930. He has been in charge of the Union Creek district since then.  
Mr. DeWitt has been rated as one of the most conscientious and efficient district rangers in the forest service. Always courteous and willing to serve the public capably and sincerely, he has upheld the traditions for which the forest service has become world-famous.  
Mrs. DeWitt is also a veteran of the United States forest service. She entered the service as a clerk in the same year as Mr. DeWitt, 1907. She served in New Mexico and Montana before entering a 15-year employment with the Rogue River national forest in 1927.

## HIGHWAY CHANGES TO BE DISCUSSED AT MEET JUNE 4TH

The newly-formed Association of Southern Oregon Chambers of Commerce will meet with the state highway commission in the Hotel Medford next Saturday evening. It was announced yesterday by A. H. Banwell, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.  
The meeting will discuss highway development and improvement, including completion of the new Pacific highway over the Siskiyou mountains and elimination of curves in the same highway between Grants Pass and Roseburg.  
The association, organized at a meeting here last Wednesday, will meet for dinner at 7 o'clock and the highway commissioners will join the group a little later. Mr. Banwell said.  
The chambers of commerce of Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass, Roseburg and Yreka, Calif., will be represented and attendance of as many members as possible was urged in a telegram received by Mr. Banwell from A. C. Marsters of Roseburg, association president.  
To prepare its agenda, Mr. Marsters called a meeting of the association's general committee on highway development for 3 o'clock in the Hotel Medford Saturday afternoon prior to the dinner. The committee comprises three members from the roads and highways committees of each of the member chambers of commerce.  
Committee for the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce was announced by President Eugene Thorndike as follows: A. S. V. Carpenter, chairman, Karl L. Janouch and Paul Rynning. Olen Arnsperger was appointed to be present to take care of budgetary matters.
