Comment on the Day's News. By FRANK JENKINS. If someone were to tell you he had just seen a mouse walk up and spit in a lion's eye, you would say without hesitation that either he was drunk or he was LYING.

It is AGAINST NATURE for a mouse to spit in a lion's eye. It isn't possible for a whole nation to be drunk (except with lust for loot), so when Berlin accuses Czech warplanes of flying over German territory and thus "brazenly provoking" the German people, one concludes that Berlin is lying with a purpose.

This question immediately arises: Why is Berlin accusing the Czechoslovakian mouse of spitting in the German lion's eye? Berlin is building up a case for claiming that the Czechs have done an unpardonable thing for which they must be PUNISHED.

(You will remember that when Japan was bent upon conquering China she set up before the world the absurd plea that the wicked Chinese, for no reason at all, had ATTACKED Japan. Japan was therefore compelled, the story went, to defend herself.)

It is true that the Germans are building up a case for claiming that the Czechs have attacked them. It is TREMENDOUSLY important, because it means that Germany has decided to seize Czechoslovakia, by force if necessary, regardless of what Britain and France and Russia may do about it.

That would mean WAR. It is one thing to seize Austria, or Ethiopia, or even to wage undeclared war in Spain; but it is another thing entirely to seize Czechoslovakia, which from time immemorial has been Europe's most strategic point.

Invading Bohemia (now Czechoslovakia) has always plunged Europe into war in the past. It is beyond belief that it will not do so again.

(Continued from Page One) through in good shape. Meanwhile, the Guffey-Earle machine was split wide open. The maldorored dolings of its chieftains were exposed to the public gaze. And, having won his primary, the pudler now finds an open course before him in the election race.

The pudler's career is an interesting story. A poor Welsh immigrant, he really was a steel pudler in his youth, but he early discovered that it was easier to make a living among the fraternal organizations and in labor politics. He worked hard in both fields.

If anything, he gave more effort to his fraternal organizations than to his labor politics. He is still a Mission, Myrtle, Gardner, Grotto, God Fellow, Knight of Pythias, Ek, Eagle, Forester, Protected Home Circle, Knight of the Golden Eagle, Woodman of the World, Maccabee and Moose. He is proud of being a Moose. He loves the Moose and cherishes them. Due to a lottery mix-up, it was once even said that he was the only man who ever milked a Moose, but a jury thought differently.

By 1921, he was such a prominent leader, and a labor politician of such special caliber that he was a natural for secretary of labor in the Harding cabinet. By a remarkable tenacity, he clung to the job until the people of Pennsylvania sent him to the senate in 1930.

The story of the pudler's transfer from the secretaryship to the senatorship is worth study by all young men and women desiring to get their living as servant of the people. The pudler's ambition was not to leave the payroll for as much as five minutes. Therefore, he submitted his resignation to the president.

Unhappily, there was some talk that funds had been spent improperly on the pudler's election. The senate refused to swear him on the day appointed. Meanwhile, that morning, the Hon. William Nuckles took the oath as secretary of labor. The pudler, distraught, ignored his successor, and hastened back to his old office in the labor department. There he stayed, firmly maintaining he was still secretary, until President Hoover commanded him to be gone. He did not quite attain the goal he shot for. He was off the payroll for several hours. But his effort is a beautiful lesson for beginners.
