

ELIZABETH B. FARLOW, JACKSON CO. PIONEER, GOES TO FINAL REST

Elizabeth Baldwin Farlow, Jackson county pioneer, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. W. Slinger, at 27 Washington street, Medford, early this morning, at the age of nearly 88.

Elizabeth Baldwin was born at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, August 27, 1850. At the age of 12, she crossed the plains with her parents by ox-team and settled at Portland. Six months were required to make the journey. At the age of 20, she was married to Atto, Linn county, to Mr. Farlow, now deceased. The same year of their marriage, 1870, they came to Jackson county and settled at Lake Creek, where she spent the rest of her life except the last few years which she spent with Mrs. Slinger and a sister. Mrs. Farlow was a member of the Methodist church.

She was the mother of seven children, three of whom survive, Mrs. J. W. Slinger and Tom Farlow of Medford and Frank Farlow of Lake Creek. She also leaves 12 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren. Her only sister, Mrs. John Miller, resides at Eagle Point.

Funeral arrangements will be announced later by Conger Funeral parlors.

ANNA RORDEN, 68, DIES, TABLE ROCK

The body will be forwarded Wednesday evening to Silverton, Ore., for interment.

NICK YOUNG GIVEN DUAL NOMINATION

Nick Young, Republican candidate for constable for the Medford district, and unopposed in his own party in the primary, also received the most votes in the Democratic party. The official count shows Constable Young received 38 write-in votes. His nearest competitor received 35. A score of other Democrats received a complimentary vote for the job.

Including the 655 write-in votes accorded Governor Martin, in the Republican primary, there were close to 1,200 write-ins in Jackson county. This increased the work of the canvassing board. The count was completed last Friday. An abstract of the votes is now being made. Certificates of election will be issued as soon as this is completed.

Mary Ann Stevens, 72, resident and pioneer daughter of Jackson county, passed away at her home in Medford, Sunday, May 29, following an illness of three weeks.

Mrs. Stevens was born August 11, 1864, at Logtown in the Applegate district. Mary Ann Smith was united in marriage to Thomas A. Stevens, March 16, 1890. After residing in southern Oregon for a short time, they moved to California where they remained until 1912 and returned to Jackson county, where she spent the rest of her life.

Besides her husband, Thomas A. Stevens, she leaves five children, Claude Stevens of Medford; Mrs. Robert Lewis, Table Rock; Fred and Albert Stevens of Medford and Mrs. William Force of Gold Hill. Nine grandchildren also survive. There are granddaughters and two brothers, Mrs. Lillie McDonough and Ed A. Smith of Rich and J. A. Smith of San Francisco.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Conger chapel at 2:30 Wednesday, with Rev. Joseph Knutts officiating. Interment will be in the Logtown cemetery near Rich.

NEW YORK, May 31.—(AP)—Barney Ross weighed 142 pounds to Henry Armstrong's 133 1/2 when the two fighters met at the state athletic commission at noon today for final physical check-ups for their 15-round scrap tonight at Madison Square Garden bowl.

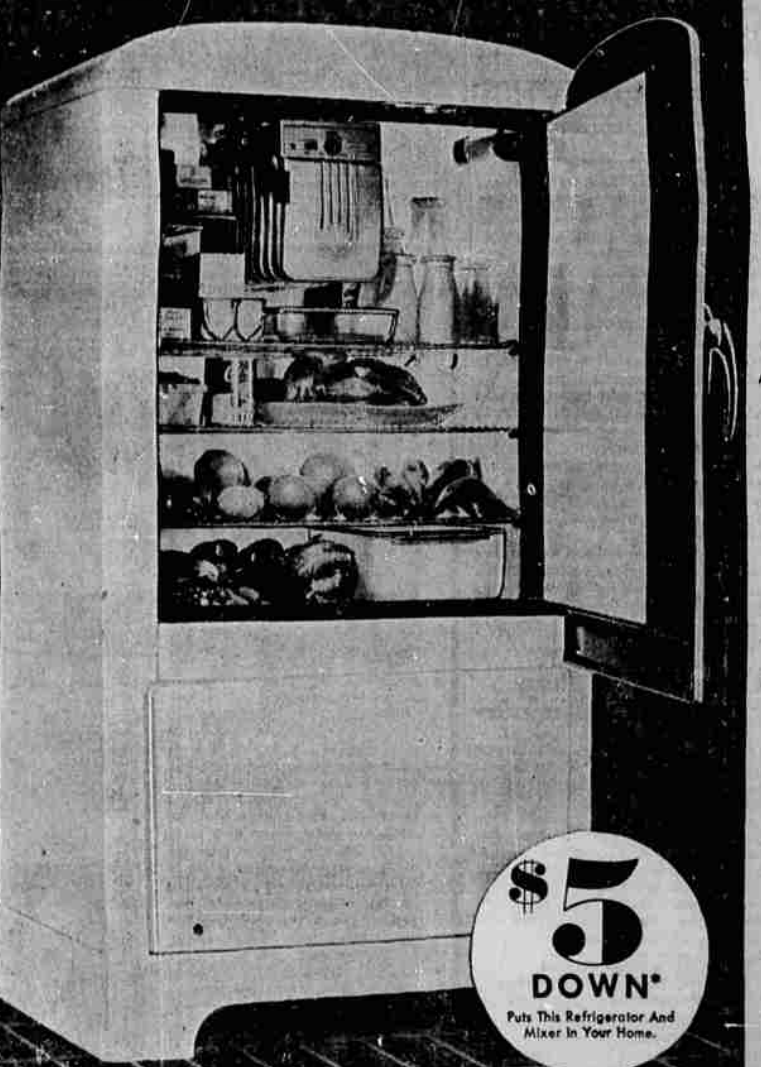
