More than 800 cars were registered at Crater Lake national park Sunday, only a slightly smaller number being recorded at the famed resort yesterday. It was stated by J. Carlisle Crouch, chief ranger who came to Medford on business today.

The McKee Bridge and Beaver Sulphur campgrounds in the Applegate district of the Rogue River national forest were taxed to capacity both Sunday and Monday. Mr. and Mrs. Harold Reed of Jacksonville have opened a store across the road from the McKee bridge campground where picnickers may now procure groceries, refreshments and motor-car fuel and lubricants.

Fishing and boating attracted a crowd to Fall lake each day of the holiday period. Angling also was a popular sport on most of the streams and at all of the accessible lakes. Especially good results were obtained at Squaw lake, the United States forest service reported.

Many valley residents spent the holiday at their summer cabins on rivers and lakes, the Union Creek area being one of the popular spots. Mr. Crouch said conditions were at their best for sight-seeing at Crater lake. TWO MUST HANG FOR SLAYING U. S. AGENT

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(AP)—Two men convicted of killing Wimberly W. Baker, federal agent, at the Topeka, Kas., postoffice in April 1937, failed to induce the supreme court today to prevent their death by hanging.

The court refused to pass upon a decision of the tenth circuit court of appeals upholding the convictions of Robert Suhay and Glen Applegate in the federal district court of Topeka.

Suhay and Applegate were alleged to have stolen an automobile in New York City and robbed a bank at Keaton, N. Y., of \$18,000. They were objects of a nationwide search.
