

40 ET 8 CEREMONIAL TO BE HELD SATURDAY OREGON CAVES RESORT

Members of the "40 et 8" society of Oregon and California will gather at the Oregon Caves, Saturday, June 4, for the third annual ceremonial of the World War veterans' organization. The event will draw many prominent state officials of both the "40 et 8" and American Legion and present indications point to a most successful affair.

The attractive new chateau, with its many unique features, has been reserved for the voyageurs and their wives and will be the center of the social part of the program, which will include the official banquet at 8:30 p. m., to be followed by dancing. The ceremonial is to be staged in the famous "Ghost Chamber" of the Oregon Caves, 3200 feet underground, which will provide one of the most impressive settings to be found in the entire United States.

A large class of candidates will be introduced to the many mysteries and foreign customs of "La Societe," the initiatory work being in charge of Grand Chef de Gare Bert Haffenden and officials of Portland Vulture No. 25.

All arrangements are in charge of Southern Oregon Vulture No. 165, the following committees taking care of the various details: Chief de Gare Earl York, general chairman; Neil Allen, housing; Earl Fay, reception; Walter Looker, banquet; Lee Garlock, ceremonial, and Horace Bromley, publicity.

Local voyageurs are urged to make their reservations for rooms and the banquet at once for, although the entire chateau and cabins have been reserved, a capacity crowd is anticipated.

IRRIGATION DITCH RIGHT IS SOUGHT

Suit has been filed by the Rogue River Valley irrigation district against I. D. Phipps for a right of way for a diversion ditch on Bear creek near the Jackson street bridge. The ditch runs through a portion of Phipps' property.

Phipps contends the irrigation district has no written right of way. The irrigation district claims, by virtue of long usage over a period of 15 years, it has established rights, and discontinuance would menace crops. A temporary injunction prohibiting interference pending the outcome of the action is also sought. Attorney Harry Skyrman represents the irrigation district.

EMPLOYABLES MUST TAKE JOBS OFFERED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 2.—(AP)—The state relief committee moved to reduce the assistance rolls today by ruling that all employable persons were required to accept the jobs offered by the county committee.

Chairman Jack Lullin, who called for county figures on the number of relief clients, said several sections had succeeded in placing all employable who received aid during the winter.

The chairman said the ruling would not affect persons working on federal projects.

PHOENIX COAL MINE INVITES INSPECTION IN NEXT THREE DAYS

United Coal company's mine, 3 1/2 miles east of Phoenix, will be open for public inspection Friday, Saturday and Sunday. It was announced today by L. L. Davis, general manager. The property was formerly known as the Black Bear mine.

The present mining operation will be exposed for 14 feet from foot to hanging, Mr. Davis said. He urged the public to inspect the property during the next three days as work to be started next week will conceal present exposures.

Present plans call for the start of work on a drift and the erection of bunkers next week, Mr. Davis said. To the present most of the work has been confined to the old operations but next week production of coal will be started in earnest, he asserted.

The mine may be reached from Medford by turning off the Pacific highway into Barnett road opposite the Cas. wrecking yard. Signs will be posted to direct visitors to the mine, situated two miles east of the North Phoenix school, Mr. Davis said.

WHITE SLAVERY TRIAL ENDED BY UNEXPECTED ADMISSION OF GUILT

SAN FRANCISCO, June 2.—(UP)—Grant McGregor, on trial on charges of having contributed to the delinquency of 19-year-old Jeanne Walters, Montana farm girl, by placing her in houses of prostitution, entered an unexpected plea of guilty to two charges of pandering today, ending the trial.

McGregor offered to plead guilty to the pandering charges, carrying a maximum penalty of one to ten years, if three charges of accepting the earnings of a prostitute and one of contributing to the delinquency of a minor were dismissed.

Judge I. M. Golden accepted the pleas, dismissed the jury and set July 9 to hear a plea for probation.

Earlier in the day, Jeanne Ratley, also involved in the Walters case and convicted in a previous trial, turned state's evidence and told from the witness stand that McGregor took the Great Falls, Mont., girl from a tavern where she worked as a B-girl and placed her in a house of prostitution. She also told how McGregor "farmed" Miss Walters out to another house.

Miss Ratley and William Coburn were convicted on pandering and contributing to delinquency charges and face possible prison terms of 35 to 40 years.
