

# British Walker Cuppers Take 2 to 1 Lead in Inaugural Foursomes.

## YATES, BILLOWS ONLY AMERICANS WINNING MATCH

### Goodman And Ward Drop 4-2 Decision To Scottish Combine—Fischer, Koosis Tie With British Pair.

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, June 3.—(AP)—Great Britain's Walker cup golfers, seeking their first victory in the international series begun in 1922, came off the St. Andrews old course at the end of today's inaugural Scotch foursome matches holding a 2-to-1 lead over the United States trophy defenders.

Of the four American combinations, that of Charles Yates of Atlanta, winner of the British amateur title last week, and Ray Billows of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., came through to victory. They turned back Charles Stowe and Alex Kyle of England, 3 and 2, after holding a seven-up lead at 27 holes.

Johnny Goodman, U. S. amateur champion, and his partner, Marvin (Bud) Ward of Olympia, Wash., dropped a 4-and-2 decision to the all-Scottish combine of Hector Thomson and Gordon Peters, while Fred Hass, Jr., of New Orleans and Reynolds Smith of Dallas were nosed out, 2 and 1, by Leonard Crowley and Frank Pennink, both Englishmen.

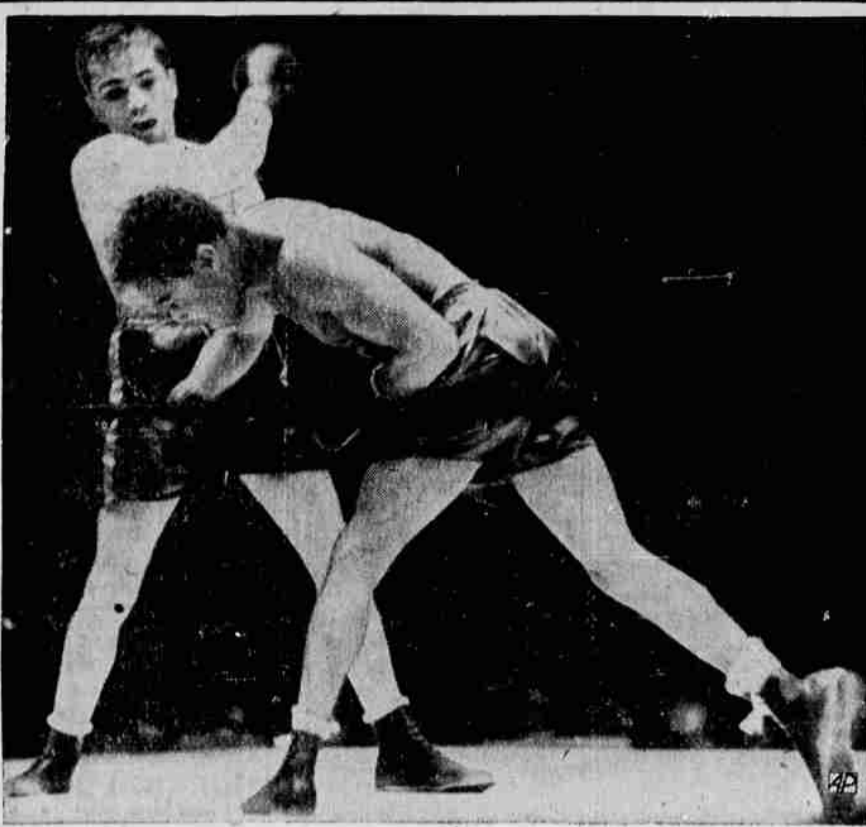
The No. 1 teams, Johnny Fischer of Cincinnati and Charles (Chuck) Koosis of Detroit for the United States and young Jim Bruen and Harry Bentley for Britain, finished their 36-hole struggle all square. Two up after 27 holes, the Americans couldn't match the blistering pace set by the Britons, who romped home in 32, five under par, for an afternoon 18-hole score of 68, also five under par.

Fischer and Koosis shot a 76 in the afternoon and posted a 72 to the Bentley-Bruen 75 in the morning. The two British points were the first the home forces have been able to score since 1934, when they lost, 9 matches to 2. Two years ago, at Pine Valley, N. J., they were shut out, 9 to 0, while halving three matches.

But for one of the most generous gestures any British team ever made to America, the score would have been 3 to 1 for Britain. At the 21st hole, with the U. S. team leading, 3 up, Fischer inadvertently played out of turn. Bentley and Bruen, however, refused to accept the penalty to which they were entitled, and then went on to their brilliant finishing burst.

Southern Oregon league's rousing stretch battle for the first-half pennant develops in earnest this Sunday as the six clubs, with only two games separating the league-leaders and the cellar occupants, swing into their fifth week of activity.

After Sunday's encounters, only three more games will remain before the first-half ends, June 26, and all indications point to a bitterly-fought finish.

Medford's Graters, setting the pace with three wins and one loss, travel to Glendale to engage the rough, tough and pennant-contending Loggers, deadlocked with Crescent City for second place with two victories and two defeats. Lowell Brown, southpaw ace, will do the Medford hurling and Cliff "Chief" McLean the catching. Glendale will counter with Merle Johnson, brilliant righthander, in the box and Frank Thompson back of the plate.

Grants Pass will send either Steve Crippen, red-headed righthander, or Glen Elliott, young southpaw, to the mound against Ashland's Lithians at Ashland, with Al Drolette wearing the mask and protector. Drolette has been shifted from first base to the catching spot because of his extreme value in working young hurlers. ## SALVO'S STRING CUT BY SOLONS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3.—(AP)—Lefty Manuel Salvo, San Diego's ace pitcher, got a least a little satisfaction out of losing to the Pacific Coast baseball league leading Sacramento Solons.

The Senators snapped Salvo's winning streak at eight games by beating him 6 to 3 last night, but in losing, Salvo struck out six Solons and became the circuit's leading strikeout pitcher. He has fanned 70 since the season started, four more than his nearest competitor, Gene Lillard, Los Angeles' reformed third baseman. Altogether this season, Salvo has won nine games and lost three.

After an impressive start, in which he fanned five in the first two innings, Salvo weakened and was replaced in the sixth after the Solons had nicked him for four runs. The Solons got the rest of their tallies off Jim Chaplin.

## Sport Graphs

Billy Hulen says:

### Salmon Finicky About Color Of Anglers' Spoons

If you want to be a successful angler for Rogue river Chinook salmon, pay more attention to the color combination on your spinner. For it seems that fish, instead of being color-blind, are highly sensitive to the most delicate shades of color and to the most harmonious blending, striking only at spinners whose pastel shades appeal to their appetite and having positively nothing to do with lures that strike a discordant note in their sight-sense.

Authority for that revelation is Joe Wharton of the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce, who deals at some length on the subject in his weekly fishing bulletin. As Mr. Wharton is considered a good authority in matters of angling in the river which flows through Grants Pass' back yard, his word should be of more than passing interest to many local fishermen.

Wharton cites a nice example to prove his point, writing, "A day when they were slow in striking, a lady angler cut a beautiful red tassel from her hat and tied it to the hook. 'Believe It Or Not' (with apologies to Bob Ripley), she straightaway took her limit and no other fisher had even a strike. For several days thereafter, every spinner that went into the water had a red tassel, or bunch of red feathers tied to it, and there was terrific slaughter."

"Such enudic decorations soon pulled and then someone took the limit on a blade painted all the blues of the rainbow. Again there was slaughter for a brief period, and again they quit striking. A slight color rearrangement—red at the apex, yellow in the middle shading to creamy white at the bottom of the blade and the whole sprinkled with atoms of lusterite stimulated the fish again. This had the rainbow on the outside, or convex side of the blade, brass on the inside. They soon tired of this combination so the color was reversed—rainbow on the inside, brass on the outside, and they hit again. So it goes from day to day."

Wharton writes "fiddlesticks" to the theory that fish are color-blind. For proof that they are keenly aware of different colors and combinations, he suggests talking with "any of a hundred fishermen you will meet in a day's fishing on the

### Rogue." OK, Mr. Wharton, if you fish fish have an eye for color we are not going to dispute your word.

Glen Woodriddle, who for the past 23 years has guided Rogue river anglers to the best fishing locations, was in town the other day with some interesting information regarding the big Chinooks. He remarked that it took them about two weeks to travel from the mouth of the river at Gold Beach to Grants Pass, a distance of some 130 miles, or about 11 miles a day. He said they do not travel at night in muddy water, but that if the water is clear they continue their day-time pace.

Woodriddle, who earns his bread and butter on the river and who naturally hopes for big salmon runs, was frank in stating that this year's supply of fish was, so far, below average. "It has been about one-tenth the normal number," he said, "and nobody seems to be able to explain it the reason. There were only two good runs last month, and even then the number landed was far below usual. However at least two more schools are expected to enter the mouth shortly, so there may be some great fishing yet."

Woodriddle said it was the poorest season he had seen in 23 years, and local anglers and sporting goods dealers have also been shedding tears to the same effect. What the cause is, nobody seems to know. The same situation is apparent in the Columbia river, according to press dispatches, although the Rogue has not been so hard hit by the shortage.

### Gordon To Warm Bench For Yankees

NEW YORK, June 3.—(AP)—Chance took Joe "Flash" Gordon temporarily out of the New York Yankee lineup but Second Baseman Knickerbocker has put in his bid to make it permanent.

Gordon, former University of Oregon infielder, started his first season in the major leagues as a regular. He crashed with Joe DiMaggio while chasing a short fly at Washington several weeks ago and received minor injuries.

Although the youngster has recovered, Knickerbocker has been hitting and fielding too consistently to warrant a change in the New York infield.
