**Huge Bee Swarm Enlivens City's Downtown Section**

Medford's annual swarm of bees on North Central avenue made its appearance shortly before noon today.  
 Buzzing and humming, thousands of the honey-makers slowly worked their way from the Main street intersection and, despite a loud beeping of horns and keening on Central avenue by citizens attempting to make them live in a miscellaneous assortment of boxes and baskets, finally settled on the limb of a tree in the yard of the First Baptist church at the corner of Fifth street.  
 There, the bees were properly dived by James Stewart of 336 Plum street, local apiarist, who climbed up a long ladder and raked them into a bee box. With the queen alive in the hordes of workers followed in short order.  
 The bees were traveling low on their flight down Central avenue, never more than 30 feet above the street. Automobiles drove slowly through the swarm with their windows carefully rolled up. Although hundreds of pedestrians flocked about to see the unusual sight, nobody was stung, so far as known. It took the bees about an hour to travel the two blocks from Main to Fifth street.  
 They were first seen almost directly over the Main street and Central avenue intersection, at which point they make their yearly appearance at about this time. Mr. Stewart said that apparently there was a hive on top of one of the buildings at that corner.

**CALL SPECIAL COUNCIL FOR PAVING PROPOSALS**

A special meeting of the council will be held in chambers at city hall at 7:30 tonight to open sealed proposals on the reconstruction, repair and resurfacing of paved streets.  
 The work is to be done under the \$50,000 bond issue authorized some time ago at a special election. In addition to the bond issue the voters also approved a special levy to provide about \$15,000 annually for the next five years for the same sort of work.

**FORMER JUDGE RAPS JUVENILE TRIBUNALS**

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif.—(AP)—Jesse Olney, former judge of the superior court, is in favor of doing away with juvenile courts.  
 "It is fast developing into a complete system of fascism," he writes in the California State Bar Journal. "Our youth are jailed, bailed, granted or denied rights on the mere order of probation officers, county attorneys, sheriffs and other executive officers."  
 On the other side, it "presents the great loophole to young criminals in their escape from punishment," he writes. "We turn them over to the juvenile court, which turns them again loose on the community on probation."
