

SOUTH AMERICANS REVIVE OLD ROW, TROOPS MASSING

Peru, Ecuador Add New Dish To World's Trouble Menu—Berlin Protest Warms Czech Dispute.

By the Associated Press A warmed over border dispute between Peru and Ecuador was added today to the world's menu of international trouble.

Two Ecuadorian soldiers were killed and a third wounded yesterday in a clash with three Peruvian river gunboats in a jungle that had figured in the 107-year-old dispute.

Ecuador ordered her troops to "defend themselves with all their characteristic valor" and Peru was reported "massing troops."

The Czechoslovakia-German situation which had wavered for two weeks between hot and mildly warm slumbers anew with a fresh protest from Berlin to Praha against new incidents in which members of Czechoslovakia's Germanic minority were said to have been mistreated.

Japan completed a drastic cabinet reorganization, Lieut-Gen. Seishiro Itagaki taking the war ministry, as Chinese defending the railway approach to Hankow appeared to be weakening under Japanese shells and bombs.

Prime Minister Chamberlain announced new British protests against aerial bombardments in China and Spain in representations addressed to

Tokyo and to the Burgos insurgent regime. An opposition member of parliament asked if the British proposed to do anything "at all apart from holding up their hands in horror." To which the prime minister replied: "If we could hold up the hands of other people we certainly would do so."

With the Spanish non-intervention committee finally in accord on a plan to withdraw foreign soldiers from the "internationalized" civil war, a Spanish government spokesman in Paris admitted the "possibility" of British-French mediation.

In Paris and London it was believed that troop withdrawals would be impossible without a pause in the war which, despite strong government resistance on the Dnieper-to-the-sea front, brought insurgent success near Albacete near the coast.

The fall of Albacete would open the way for a push southward along the Mediterranean on Castellon de la Plana and Valencia.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—(P)—Secretary Wallace today ordered Swift & company, Chicago packing concern, to cease using credit, discount and weight practices which Wallace ruled were discriminatory in the sale of its products.

The order was issued on the basis of extended hearings on a complaint that the company had employed "unfair, unjustly discriminatory and deceptive practices" in selling its products in New England states, New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

The action was taken under authority of the packers and stockyards act which gives the department of agriculture power to supervise interstate commerce activities of packing concerns and livestock markets.

MARSHFIELD BOY DIES OF INJURIES IN SMASHUP HERE

Broken Neck Fatal For Thomas Armstrong, 20—Death 48 Hours After So. Riverside Accident.

Medford's first traffic fatality of 1938 was recorded last night when Thomas Foster Armstrong, 20-year-old Marshfield youth, died in Community hospital from a broken neck sustained in an automobile accident on South Riverside avenue Wednesday evening at 8:30.

Armstrong died at 7:45 o'clock from what his attending physician described as a crushed fracture of the fifth cervical vertebra, which had caused complete paralysis of the legs and partial paralysis of the arms, due to the injury to the spinal cord.

The body, in charge of the Peri funeral home, will be shipped to his home in Marshfield tomorrow for burial. County Coroner Frank Peri said there would be no inquest.

Armstrong's death came a little less than 48 hours after the De Soto roadster he was driving north on South Riverside crashed into a parked Ford coupe belonging to C. C. Proctor, employee of Consolidated Freight Lines, Inc. After striking the left rear fender and wheel of the Ford, parked in front of the freight office, the De Soto careened off, jumped the curb and continued into a vacant lot for 125 feet, according to the investigating state police officer.

Landed On Neck Armstrong was thrown clear of the car and apparently landed on his neck on a two-by-four board in the vacant lot, police said. Armstrong's attending physician explained there was a long mark on the right side of his neck. Following the accident, he was rushed to Community hospital in the Peri ambulance, and never fully regained consciousness. His doctor said he got steadily worse despite all efforts to save his life.

Mr. Proctor, in a city police report of the accident, stated that his car was parked at the curb 30 feet from the lighted intersection on the right side of the street, headed north. It was parked directly in front of the freight office at 445 South Riverside avenue.

No Eye Witnesses There were no eye witnesses to the crash, according to state police, Louis Vance Stone, 24, who lives near Voorhies crossing on the south Pacific highway and who was a passenger in the DeSoto, was uninjured. Stone told state police that Armstrong was forced to swing his machine into the parked car by the approach of an oncoming auto on the wrong side of the street. Police believe the Armstrong car was traveling at a high rate of speed.

Armstrong had been visiting for a few days with Stone, and was to have returned to Marshfield yesterday. They had both been employed in a lumber camp in the Coos bay area.

The youth was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Foster Armstrong of Marshfield.

LARGE SUIT EYED BY AUTO DEALERS OF PACIFIC COAST

A suit which automobile dealers are watching closely, believed to be the first of its kind instituted on the west coast, was on file today in the Multnomah county circuit court as Portland.

Plaintiff is H. F. Lange, head of the Lange Motor Car company, Medford dealer for Chrysler and Plymouth cars, and defendant is the Torula Motor Car company, Oregon distributors of these automobiles.

Mr. Lange is suing for about \$18,000 for alleged overcharges made by the Portland distributor on automobiles sold to the Lange Motor Car company and its predecessor, Armstrong Motors, Inc.

Armstrong Motors, Inc. of which Mr. Lange was a part owner, was first made the local Chrysler and Plymouth dealer in September, 1932, the complaint sets forth. In November, 1935, Mr. Lange took over the Armstrong business and has since been the dealer for this area, the complaint states.

According to the complaint, the alleged overcharges began in January, 1935, and continued until December 31, 1937, and totaled more than \$18,000. It is further alleged that the dealer did not know he was being overcharged and had no way of ascertaining what the billing prices should have been.

SEGREGATION OF FRUIT, CANNING PAY RATES, AIM

Objectives Of Hearing Here June 11 Clarified By Local Packers—All Interested Invited To Attend.

An erroneous impression prevails here that a proposed reduction in packing plant wages is the primary subject to be considered at the hearing set by the state bureau of labor and welfare commission for June 11 at 9:30 a. m. in the Jackson court circuit room, fruit men state today.

The hearing was requested, the fruit men said, primarily for the presentation to the state welfare commission of a recommendation for the segregation of the fresh fruit industry and the canning industry, it being maintained that the two industries are not comparable, operating under different conditions and in different localities.

Second Objective Another object of the hearing, the fruit men stated, is to consider re-establishment of the minimum hourly rate of wages for women workers engaged only in the fresh fruit industry. It was explained that the labor commission had nothing to do with the wage scale of fruit packers actually engaged in wrapping fruit.

So far as local wages are concerned, the hearing will affect only the minimum compensation required by law to be paid women workers engaged in sorting or like tasks in fruit handling, the spokesman for the fruit industry related.

Board Appointed A conference board to preside at the hearing has been appointed by C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner. Representing the public will be Attorney Porter J. Neff, conference chairman; the Rev. E. S. Bartlett and Mrs. Margaret Fabricik.

Raymond R. Reter, Lester Newberry and Jack Spalding were named to represent the employers. Harold Bithers, Mrs. Lena Clemens and Mrs. Grace Pankey were appointed to represent the workers.

Anyone interested in the subject matter is invited to the hearing.
