

# British Golfers Snare Walker Cup From America For First Time

## 16 YEARS BATTLE FOR TROPHY ENDS IN DECISIVE WIN

### Capture 7 Matches To 4, Before 10,000—Pacific Coast Youngster Stars With Brilliant Scoring.

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, June 4.—(AP)—An ancient St. Andrews caddy his blue eyes swimming with tears, carried America's Walker cup into the historic front room of the royal and ancient golf club tonight and set it up triumphantly under the portrait of old Tom Morris, almost legendary figure in the annals of British golf.

For 16 years Great Britain had tried to win the trophy. Three times it had visited this old gray clubhouse and gone home again. But today Britain won it 7 matches to 4, and the old man carrying it through a cheering crowd of 10,000 was proud and he was happy.

The facts of this victory—and it was a decisive victory—can be summarized.

The British led at the end of Scotch foursome play yesterday by 2 to 1, having halved the other match.

Marvin (Bud) Ward of Olympia, Wash., squared it today by playing 35 holes in five under pars to beat Frank Pennink, English amateur champion in 1937 and 1938, 12 and 11.

Scotland's Hector Thomson thumped what was only a strange shadow of Johnny Goodman, 6 and 4, but irrepressible Charley Yates, who won the British amateur just a week ago, came back with a 2 and 1 victory over Jim Bruen to tie it up again at 3 to 3.

Then, for a brief and brilliant period, the United States led 4 to 3 as Johnny Fischer, playing one of the most heroic games of his life, reeled off 16 holes in six under 4's to make up a four-hole deficit and beat a much-sensational Leonard Crawley, 5 and 2.

After that, however, America's resistance collapsed.

Brightest spot on the American side of the picture, in addition to victories by Yates, who hung on to beat Bruen, and Fischer, who came back to beat Crawley, was the brilliant scoring of Ward.

The Pacific coast youngster, rated by British critics the weakest member of the United States team and re-started off with an outgoing 32 in the morning that was four under par and left him six up. He came back in 35, two under par, winning four more holes to be 9 up; picked up after lunch with the same deadly accuracy on the greens, and didn't lose a hole of the 25 the match lasted.

His 67 was one stroke better than Bobby Jones' amateur course record and, though match play scores usually are not accepted as records, this one deserved to be since Pennink made the young westerner hole every putt. Ward's 12 and 11 margin has been bettered just once and equalled once in nine previous matches—bettered by Jones who beat Phil Perkins, 15 and 12, in 1928, and equalled by Jones, against Cyril Tolley in 1926.

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## SOFTBALL TEAMS WILL OPEN PLAY TUESDAY EVENING

With 14 highly-trained softball teams signed for action, and with enthusiasm mounting as the big night draws near, plans are being rapidly completed for the gala opening under the lights at the high school stadium next Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock.

This season, all clubs are united in one league, which is divided into two divisions—A and B. The A division, consisting of eight high-powered outfits ready to display an expert brand of softball, will play a 11-game split season schedule, each team meeting the others twice.

Winners of each half will play for the championship at the end of the season.

Division B consists of six clubs and will play a 10-game schedule, every team meeting the others twice.

To give B division clubs the opportunity of advancing into the A division, a ladder arrangement has been provided whereby the top B division team can challenge the bottom A division outfit, and by winning will automatically enter the upper division.

## TROJAN TRACKMEN SET NEW RECORDS, WIN C.A.A.A. TITLE

NEW YORK, June 4.—(AP)—Rain and records, a rare track and field combination, fell in large quantities today as Southern California's invincible Trojans spreadeagled the field in the 62nd intercollegiate A.A.A.A. championship meet at Randall's Island stadium.

Three meet marks were shattered, among them the classic one-mile record that has stood for 25 years, and two others were equaled in a dazzling battle for individual titles that accompanied Southern California's one-sided team triumph.

Dean Cromwell's Trojans, picking up where they left off in 1935, had not the slightest trouble capturing the team trophy. They tallied in 10 of the 15 events, nearly doubled the point score of their nearest rivals, Michigan State, and won the championship for the eighth time since 1929. All told Pacific coast colleges have won 15 of the 16 C.A.A.A. meets in which they have participated since 1921.

Southern California tallied 47½ points, Michigan State 24 and the University of California 22½ to make it 1-2-3 for the invading forces from the west. Pittsburgh, 1937 victor, led the eastern brigade by finishing fourth with 20½ points. Manhattan was fifth with 15 points, Harvard sixth with 12 points, with the others scattered as follows:

Princeton, 10½; New York University, 10; Rhode Island State, 9; Columbia, 8½; Cornell and Penn State, 7 each; Yale, 6½; Brown, 5; Boston college and Maine, 4 each; Syracuse and U.C.L.A., 3 each; Fordham and Colgate, 2 each; West Virginia and Pennsylvania, 1 each.
