

Southern Oregon Shriners Leave Today For Los Angeles Convention

SHRINER SPECIAL OFF FOR IMPERIAL COUNCIL SESSION

Scores of fez-wearing nobles of Hillah Temple pulled out of Medford at 6 o'clock this morning aboard a gaily-decorated special train which will carry them to the annual Imperial Council session in Los Angeles opening June 5 and ending four days later. More than 150 nobles and their wives from Grants Pass, Medford, and Ashland will jam the special train, consisting of 12 cars, including a baggage car, hospital car, diner and observation car.

The train left Grants Pass at 5 o'clock this morning, and after picking up Medford nobles, was to do the same at Ashland and meet the Klamath Falls special at Dunsmuir. There, the two were to be combined and proceed to Sacramento, arriving there at 7 p. m. today. Two hours later, the train was scheduled to leave for Oakland, and from Oakland to travel straight down the coast to Los Angeles, arriving there at 11 o'clock Monday morning.

There will be an elaborate program in Los Angeles for the expected 100,000 Shriners and their families from all over the nation. The Biltmore theatre in the Biltmore hotel will be the location of all sessions of the Imperial Council. Tuesday afternoon and evening presentation of the spectacle reviving the days of the Don's, "Cavalcade of California," will be staged in the Los Angeles Memorial coliseum. Wednesday, Shrine hands will give concerts in city parks, and at night, all uniformed organizations will parade in the coliseum.

Thursday night in the coliseum, a mammoth motion picture pageant will be presented, with a galaxy of movie stars participating along with thousands of Shriners.

ROOSTER GAGGED BY COURT RULE

That's the Valley of the Rogue.

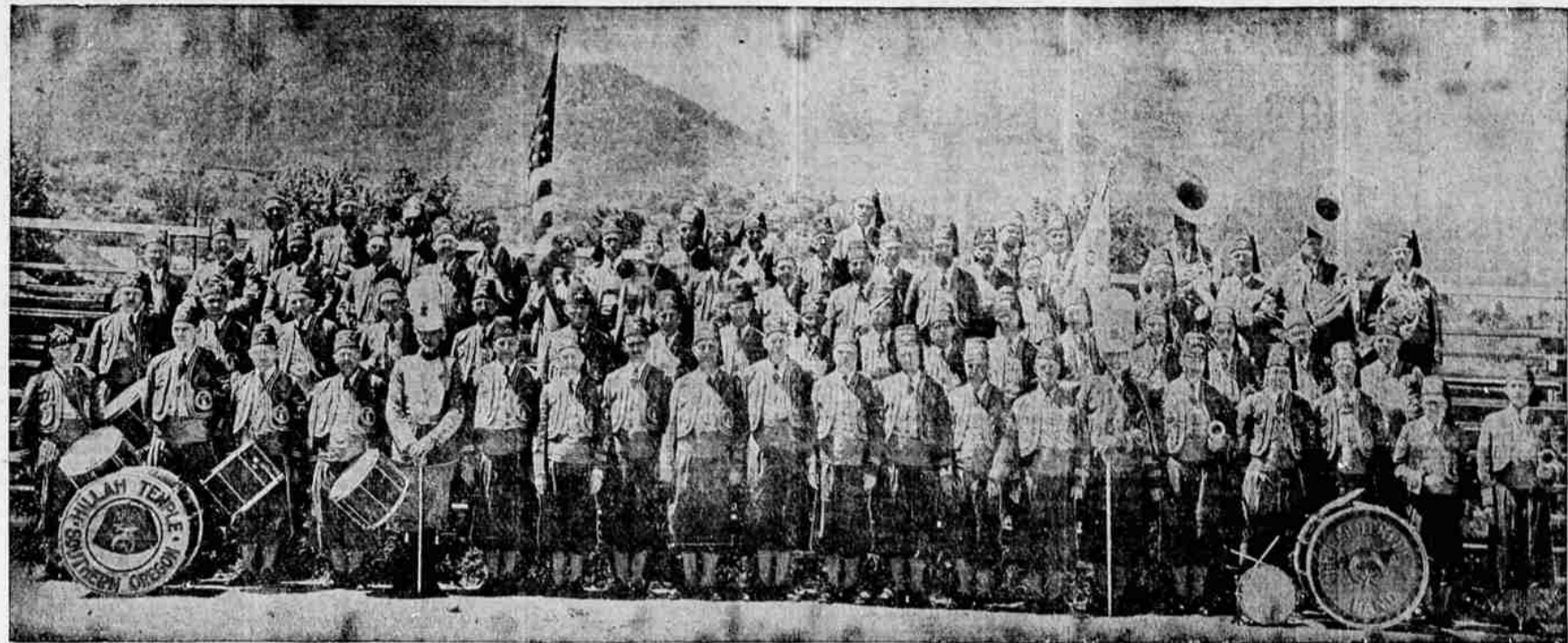
Where mountains join the sky at night

BOY SCOUTS GET FIRST HAND VIEW OF FOREST WORK

Eight Jacksonville Boy Scout leaders were given an insight into forestry the past week by executives of the Rogue River national forest. For three days the youths camped at the Union Creek ranger station, their instructor for the first two days being H. C. Obye, assistant supervisor, and for the third day Cordy Sunderman, recreation technician.

The scouts saw at first hand how bluster rust is controlled, watching a crew work on the project above Union Creek. They were also taken to the logging operations in the white pine sector of the forest where an experimental cutting is being made. The white pine is described by Karl L. Janouch, forest supervisor, as the equal of any in the United States and he is optimistic over the commercial value of the stand here. This is the first white pine operation undertaken in this section.

In the white pine area a visual study was made of cruising, marking, felling and scaling.

The three-day instruction also included study of fire control, tree identification and land uses.

The Boy Scouts making the study were Harold White, Carroll Lewis, Vernon Hamaker, Stuart Forbes, Kenneth Pursell, Joe Beach, Gage Sanden and Jack Hamilton.
