

EDITORS TO HEAR OUTSTANDING MEN IN CONCLAVE HERE

Featured Speakers Will Discuss European Problems, Newspaper Advertising, Industry Problems

Four headline attractions have already been secured for the 51st annual convention of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association here June 17 and 18.

Paul C. Smith, general manager of the San Francisco Chronicle will describe current European problems and possible conflicts which he was able to observe during his recent trip with ex-President Herbert Hoover.

Maurice Pender, assistant publisher of the San Francisco Examiner, will discuss newspaper advertising problems.

Dr. Phillip W. Buck, Stanford university political scientist who is teaching this summer in the Portland session of the Oregon System of Higher Education, will discuss current problems in the international relations.

Dr. Buck is a former Rhodes scholar. Kenneth Youel, former Oregonian who is now a member of the department of public relations of General Motors corporation, will tell of current problems facing industry and the press.

Mr. Youel was financial editor of the New York Evening Post before connecting with General Motors.

Program Arranged
A two-day program, preceded by a meeting of the board of directors of the association, filled with addresses by nationally prominent newspaper executives, advertising agents and editors, and entertainment has been arranged by the association's convention committee, headed by Robert W. Ruhl, editor of the Medford Mail Tribune.

Paul Smith's appearance on the Medford convention program will be a return engagement by request. He was a featured speaker at the Oregon Press conference at the U. of O. school of journalism in January 1937, when he addressed Oregon's editors and publishers on the subject, "Newspapering on the Fringes of Hell."

Mr. Smith traveled with Mr. Hoover last winter when he was received by King George of England, King Leopold of Belgium, Presidents Lebrun of France, Masclik of Poland and Kallio of Finland; Chancellor Hitler; and Premier Hodza, Czechoslovakia. The ex-president also received several honorary degrees from European universities.

Mr. Youel will come from New York to address the publishers' association and to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. T. Youel of Malibu. He was graduated from the University of Oregon school of journalism in 1923. While a student he was editor of the Oregon Daily Emerald. Following his graduation he was on the staffs of the Albany Democrat and Portland Oregonian. In 1923 he became a district reporter on the Brooklyn Eagle, and two years later joined the staff of the New York Evening Post, on which he became financial editor. He has been with General Motors since 1931.

Entertainment features of the convention program will include a complimentary dinner for the delegates by the Crater club of Medford; annual gold tournament on the Rogue River Valley golf association course; a tea for the women of the convention at the home of Mrs. Ernest Gilstrap; motor tour through the orchard districts to Prescott Memorial state park on Roxy Ann mountain; and the annual dinner Saturday evening.

The annual dinner at the Chateau, south of Medford, will be of a gridiron character, with prominent Oregon and California officials and citizens as guests of the association. Ben R. Latta, publisher of The Dallas Chronicle, will be master of ceremonies.

President of the association is Alton P. Baker, publisher of the Eugene Register-Guard, who will preside at the sessions. Lars E. Bladine, publisher of the McMinnville Telephone-Register, is vice-president; and Henry N. Fowler, Bend Bulletin, is the association's treasurer.

Sixty 4-H club boys and girls from all parts of Jackson county left Medford this morning on chartered buses for Corvallis to attend summer school on the Oregon State college campus June 6 to 17 for Oregon 4-H club members between ages of 12 and 21.

Chaperones accompanying the delegation are D. D. Bendure of Elk Creek, Mrs. Hilma Conger of Griffin Creek and Miss Naomi Jane Smith of Medford. All are local 4-H club leaders and were elected at the last local leaders meeting.

The Jackson county delegation met 28 Josephine county boys and girls at Grants Pass, the two groups traveling to Corvallis together.

C. D. Conrad, county club agent, in charge of the Jackson county delegation, states that this year's delegation is the largest ever to attend summer school from Jackson county, and that the large number is due primarily to support and cooperation given by Jackson county business people, granges, parent teachers associations and other organizations.

Twelve scholarships were furnished by local granges in the county, three by parent-teacher associations and three by local extension units.
