There are college scholarships—AND college scholarships. But these Harvard national scholarships are the "tops" in that field, not only for this country, but for the entire world.

**I**N the first place they are awarded on a nation-wide competitive basis, under the most stringent regulations, and demanding conditions, to those young men only, who impress the entrance committee as being the best college material, available. Not only must the successful applicant pass an extremely stiff scholastic test, but he has to qualify in the general direction of character,—not only moral character, but those attributes of character that are needed for success in later life, evidences of industry, determination, purpose, dependability, and pleasing personality.

**I**N the second place these scholarships are the most generous of the kind in the educational world,—they provide not a portion of the student's expenses, but all of them, amounting in the case of Harvard to between \$1000 and \$1200 per year. The theory behind this,—which is an entirely sound one—is that the EXCEPTIONAL young man seeking a college education should have an opportunity to concentrate upon his education and not be forced to dissipate his time and energies in collateral pursuits, necessitated by self-support.

**F**INALLY these Harvard national scholarships are the most coveted of all college scholarships, for they not only give the student maximum financial assistance, but a wealth of opportunity, both in academic and cultural directions, which can't be surpassed anywhere in the United States. A young man can't reside in the Boston-Harvard section of this country for four years and not IMBIBE certain things which will be of value to him all his life, even though he may not, get all that could be obtained from his class room and his books.

**T**HE Mail Tribune takes a certain pride in Henselman's success, for he has been a carrier boy on this paper for a number of years—where he displayed the same energy, alertness and persistence, which has brought him success in the realm of education. It is always gratifying to this paper to see its young news boys succeed in later life,—and we might add that the Mail Tribune, is making quite a name for itself, in this direction.  
No doubt some will question the wisdom of saying all this about such a young man, as Roger,—he might acquire an inflated ego. **CALCIUM AND PHOSPHORUS AND COLON HYGIENE**

In two preceding talks we explained acidity of the colon and how the diet determines whether the acid fermentation or neutral or alkaline putrefaction type of bacteria activity shall predominate there.  
Not only milk and milk products (fresh or sweet or fermented or sour) and carbohydrate food (starch and sugars) help to maintain the desired acid ascendancy but the mineral elements in the diet have a good deal to do with it and must be considered as factors in the prevention of diseases due to activity of putrefactive bacteria in the colon.  
Albino rats have an intestinal flora much like man's. In experiments in feeding rats it has been found that a diet perfect in other respects but poor in inorganic salts, fails to maintain an acid state in the intestine. But when the inorganic salts were added to the feed, the rats soon showed a marked preponderance of the acid type of fermentation and a diminution of putrefactive decomposition in the intestine.  
If the otherwise perfect diet was supplemented with sodium, potassium and chlorine, calcium alone or phosphorus alone, the acid state of the intestine could not be maintained. But when calcium and phosphorus together were added to the feed a marked predominance of acid type of lactic fermentation was maintained and the putrefactive type of bacteria (bacillus coli communis or coli-nacillus and enterococcus types) disappeared from the colon.  
This means to indicate that an adequate intake of calcium and phosphorus is essential, as well as milk and carbohydrate, to the vigorous growth of the acid forming bacteria in the intestine.  
It was observed further that when the feed lacked calcium and phosphorus the rate of growth of the rats was retarded below the normal rate of growth.  
I remind readers that when calcium and phosphorus are deficient in the diet, as is the case in many instances, the intestinal acidity of health is not maintained and putrefactive bacterial activity is favored.

**Lumbago**  
Would wheat germ, which you recommend for neuritis, relieve or cure lumbago? If so, how much should be taken daily and for how long a time? (Mrs. W. H.)  
Answer—Lumbago is pain, stiffness, lameness or soreness in the back, from any of many causes. Wheat germ would do no harm, might help some cases. Try to take one-eighth to one-fourth pound of wheat germ meal daily—in any recipe calling for flour using wheat germ meal in place of half the flour. Continue at least three months.
