TELEPHONE HEADS ADDRESS WORKERS ON GIANT HOOKUP

"We seek to carry forward the traditions and heritage of a great public service—dedicated to rendering a constantly improved service," N. R. Powley, president of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, told a vast audience of fellow employees over a coast-wide telephone hookup yesterday afternoon.

Speaking from the stage of the Bell system's employees' clubroom in Los Angeles, Mr. Powley's voice carried over 1400 miles of wire to 11,416 employees of the company listening-in at 140 stations in Oregon, California, Nevada, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

Mr. Powley commended his listeners for the great work they have done through the years, to make the American Telephone and Telegraph company one of the world's mightiest corporations dedicated to public service.

Following his personal message to employees, Mr. Powley introduced Dr. Frank B. Jewett, president of the Bell Laboratory in New York City, who is in Los Angeles for the graduation of his son from Cal Tech.

Dr. Jewett told of the hard struggle and of the many difficulties overcome in the past 30 years to make it possible for voices to be transferred and amplified with amazing clearness from one side of the continent to the other.
