Strength in the major commodities was partly responsible for the forward tilt, brokers said, the speculative demand for staples apparently reflecting a revival of the inflationary possibilities inherent in the government's forthcoming pump-priming program and the growing feeling in the financial sector the huge amount of idle bank credit may soon get to work.

Transfers approximated 600,000 shares, or more than 120,000 over the previous session.
