

MULTNOMAH SEEN DECIDING FACTOR IN OREGON VOTING

Recent Primary Canvass Shows Largest County On Prevailing Side in All Except Single Office

SALEM, June 10.—(AP)—A new political phrase, "As Multnomah county goes, so goes Oregon," might well be

adopted on the basis of the official canvass of votes for the primary election. In all but one race for offices in both party primaries the state's largest county was on the prevailing side. The exception was the Democratic race for state labor commissioner, in which Clarence F. Hyde nosed out Paul E. Roth. The voting strength of each of the two major parties was 49.4 per cent of the record primary registration. Republicans cast 181,020 votes for governor while Democrats had 120,603 votes for their gubernatorial candidates. Percentage Over Average. The percentage of voters was about average, but observers had predicted that the Democratic vote would run as high as 55 per cent because of the bitter campaign between victorious Henry L. Hess and Governor Martin.

Martin, beaten by 6,278 votes, carried 23 counties while Hess carried the other 13—Baker, Clatsop, Clackamas, Columbia, Coos, Deschutes, Lincoln, Malheur, Multnomah, Union, Tillamook, Wallowa and Washington. O. Henry Olsen did not carry a county. Among the eight candidates for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, Charles A. Sprague, the winner who got almost as many votes as his seven opponents, carried 35 counties to one for Sam H. Brown. Holman Wins in All. Alex C. Barry, republican nominee for U. S. senator (short term) carried but 10 counties, while T. McHenry Weed got 24 smaller ones. Base Treasurer Rufus C. Holman won all 36 counties in his Republican race for U. S. Senator (long term) against Robert N. Stanfield. U. S. Rep. James W. Mott carried all 17 counties in the first congressional

district to win the Republican renomination from Walter Norblad. In the second district, U. S. Balentine won 14 of the 18 counties from Bayard T. Merrill, who got four, and Rennie A. Tull. Multnomah is the only county in the third district. David F. Graham won only three counties—Grant, Harney and Malheur—in his fight against Labor Commissioner C. H. Gram, who won the Republican renomination. Willis Mahoney, who won the long term Democratic nomination for U. S. senator from U. S. Dist. Atty. Carl C. Donagh, carried all but three counties—Hood River, Sherman and Wheeler. Pierce Loses Klamath. Marion County Sheriff Andrew C. Burk, Democratic nominee for congress in the first district, lost only three of the 17 counties. Yamhill county going to Earl A. Nott, and Jackson and Josephine voting for W.

T. Miller. In the second district Democratic race, Rep. Walter M. Pierce carried 17 of 18 counties, losing Klamath to Wade Crawford. State Superintendent of Public Instruction Rex Putnam carried 40 counties to win the Democratic renomination, losing Baker, Clackamas, Malheur, Umatilla and Wallowa. Clarence F. Hyde, Democratic nominee for labor commissioner, lost only Multnomah and Wheeler counties to Paul E. Roth. Justice J. O. Bailey carried every county to win re-election against E. S. Martin. Justice Hall S. Lusk, also re-elected, carried 28 counties, losing nine to Attorney-General I. H. Van Winkle and one to James T. Chinnock. Chief Justice Henry Bean and Circuit Judge Howard K. Zimmerman who will run off in the November election, carried 26 and three counties, respectively. John W. McCul-

REQUESTS ENTERED FOR ODD PRODUCTS ON PUBLIC DOMAIN

WASHINGTON (UP)—A request for permission to haul ashes and cinders from the volcanic lava beds in the Craters of the Moon national monument, Idaho, has been received by the general land office. Commissioner Fred W. Johnson notified the applicant, a Bear River,

Utah, woman, that her request could not be granted without specific action by congress. She did not say for what purpose she wanted the ashes. The land office recently received several strange requests containing suggestions for use of products on the public domain. A North Carolina man asked permission to collect medicinal roots and herbs on the public land area. Another wanted the privilege of taking cascara bark from trees in Oregon. Several applicants wanted the right to harvest Arizona and New Mexico cactus for home decorative purposes, while another wanted to use the yucca plant in New Mexico for the manufacture of wine. In California, an applicant wanted the right to gather greasewood on the Mojave desert, to be burned and used in the manufacture of pot-

ash, while another wanted to collect a supply of gypsum for fertilizer. One applicant wanted to raise sunken logs from the Mississippi river bed, while another wanted permission to cut Christmas trees on government lands. Secretary of Interior Harold I. Ickes stated in each case that public lands have been set aside for conservation purposes and that private exploitation is forbidden without direct authorization by congress.
