

PEIPING-HANKOW RAILROAD CUT BY JAPANESE BOMBS

Action Shatters Chance for Chinese Retreat by Rail From Chengchow to Hankow—Jap Warship Sunk

SHANGHAI, June 11.—(Saturday)—(AP)—Japanese dynamiting squads were reported today to have blown up the Peiping-Hankow railway in three places south of Chengchow, shattering the chance of a railway retreat by Chinese forces from Chengchow to Hankow.

The Japanese driving on Chengchow reported progress but the Chinese asserted their attacks on the Japanese flanks had halted the push.

The Chinese said Paisha station, 13 miles east of Chengchow, had been recaptured after a 24-hour battle. Official Chinese dispatches admitted that the Japanese were shelling defense positions directly southeast of Chengchow, but insisted the Chinese still held that city.

Junction Point
Chengchow is the junction of the Peiping-Hankow, main link between Hankow, China's provisional capital, and the central front, and the southwest Lunghai railroad, the eastern

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INSULTING MIEN IS PART OF FILM STAR EQUIPMENT

Ambition To Be Successful Motivates Queer Conduct —Right to Be Temperamental Upheld By Court.

HOLLYWOOD—Jetta Goudal, who was once described in a court suit by her then employer Cecil B. DeMille as a "cocktail of emotions," won the legal right to be "temperamental" as a result of that battle. The court held that an actress' "temperament" was part of her equipment.

It was a fine victory, although by coincidence Jetta never worked importantly again. She has been happily married for some years now to Harold Griev, prominent interior decorator, and she works with her husband at his profession.

Not long ago one of her former studio associates, with whom she had tangled more than once, encountered her and was greeted most pleasantly. Jetta's friendly remarks, as reported by him: "It is so much fun not being in pictures any more. I can enjoy life and—just think—I don't have to be mean about anything!"

An Old Story
It would be interesting to trace the rise of the school of stellar thought that holds a star to be successful, must be "difficult." It certainly antedated Jetta Goudal, for some of Hollywood's best temperament tales reached circulation in the period from 1915 to 1920 when stars were first feeling their oats.

The director, Joseph von Sternberg, was a disciple, if not the high priest, of the theory. Joe had made a quickie called "Salvation Hunters" which won the support of the quick-growing colony of "intelligentsia." Even before that, showman that he was, he had made it his business to be as spectacularly insulting as possible to the right people.

"I've just made five new enemies," he once chuckled, confidentially, to some cronies.
It was Pola Negri's own idea, apparently, as she came before Joe. Her battles with Gloria Swanson became Hollywood legend. Pola's campaign, as she admitted privately when pressed, was logical. "There are many girls in Hollywood prettier than Negri—so Negri must be different."

But Marlene Dietrich, who can be as sweet as pie when she wants to be, undoubtedly took instruction direct from her mentor, von Sternberg.
That director set her off beautifully at a studio luncheon presenting her to the assembled press. "Miss Dietrich," he remarked in effect, "is not only beautiful but is far more intelligent than anyone here present."

Miss Dietrich's popularity or lack of it with many members of the correspondent corps, especially the feminine contingent, may be said to date from that moment, but in subsequent years she has shown herself to be an apt pupil. Marlene's not mean—she just has the reputation of being "difficult," which probably is truly part of "glamour."
Simone Simon came from France with certain ideas of her own about how "difficult" a foreign star should be, and immediately began living up to them. Later, repentant, she confided to intimates that she had been inspired by the advice of another foreign star—and Hollywood said, "Dietrich?"

The Hollywood Spirit
Katherine Hepburn has some reputation for being "hard to get along with." In several contacts I've never found her so, but then one robin never made a spring or a reputation, Katie put on the denture overalls and tomboy act when she first arrived partly as a "show," partly to hide nervousness, partly to enter into the "spirit of Hollywood." Her later refusals to allow visitors on her sets sprang from a conviction that she does better work when unobserved.

The "be hard to handle" theory, of course, is proved fallacious by many of our most successful stars, who get ahead by being themselves and being darn good actors and actresses. People like Warner Baxter, Ronald Colman, Joan Crawford, Bette Davis, Irene Dunne, Ginger Rogers—all of them rather well established—are not devoid of occasional flashes of "temperament" but they manage to be consistently human and regular people for all that.
