PLANS BEING SET FOR FALL'S WORK BY PEAR BUREAU

SEATTLE (Sp.)—That the Oregon-Washington-California Pear Bureau is as busy this time of year as any other was pointed out recently by Roy Webster, eastern manager of the bureau.

Some growers and shippers may think that advertising and promotion could be limited to the months when pears are on the market, but such is not the case, Mr. Webster said.

Mr. Webster is making his headquarters in Seattle. At present, he is working up a manual for the retail trade. He said:

"Of primary importance right now is the preparation of new display material which must be designed and lithographed before fall. A careful survey is made of the quantities needed for each city, based on the quantity of pears sold and the potentiality of each city, together with checking the materials left on hand from last season at the pear bureau office and stored in various cities.

"Every economy possible is made in re-using cuts and illustrations on hand from former seasons, preparing them in such a way as to give a new look and improving the quality of the material. Several new pieces are being designed now, particularly pieces combining Bosc and Anjou on the same display piece—following a new policy by the bureau of advertising Bosc and Anjou jointly.

BUCKINGHAM PALACE RECEIVES IMMUNITY TO POISON GAS WAR

LONDON (UP)—Buckingham palace and Broadcasting house are being made immune from poison gas and incendiary bombs.

Several types of anti-poison gas apparatus are being installed in the palace by two of the leading British firms specializing in air raids precautions materials and members of the royal family will take refuge in special air-conditioned rooms in the palace cellars in the event of an air raid. Provisions are also being made for the safety of other members of the royal household.

Meanwhile, the British Broadcasting corporation has placed an order for several government-approved oil-skin tents, measuring 10 feet square by 7 feet high, in which air will be kept pure by means of a small tank containing chemical salt and water, which releases oxygen.

The B. B. C. also has taken over a row of houses near Broadcasting house where air raid precautions shelters will be built. The houses will be connected to Broadcasting house by tunnels. The corridors in the basements will be blocked up and gas-proof doors will be installed. Gas filtration and air-conditioning plants will be installed at Broadcasting house and Buckingham palace. The plants are identical with those installed in the underground chambers of France's famous Maginot line.

LOUISE RAINER FILES DIVORCE APPLICATION

LOS ANGELES, June 10.—(AP)—Dark-eyed Lute Rainer of Vienna, acted as a forlorn wife so well that the movie audience gave her two awards, today sought a divorce from the playwright from the Bronx, Clifford Odets.

Back of the filing of her suit was Hollywood's eternal hazard to domestic happiness—career versus marriage.

Miss Rainer, who charged cruelly, also declared that Odets, author of "Golden Boy," one of the season's biggest stage hits, insisted that she give up her acting because he felt there should be one career only in the family.

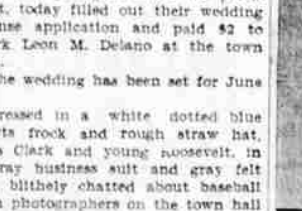
