SEEK DEPORTATION OF RONALD ROLLO

The suave youth who was sent to state prison from here recently as Ronald Rollo, after posing as a wealthy American named John Zwick, was really William Henry Whimster, a Canadian, according to Roy Norene, district director of immigration in Portland.

The youth, serving 1 1/2 years in prison for a series of bank robberies here, now faces deportation to Canada, the Oregonian quoted Norene as saying.

The district attorney's office here had no information today regarding the proposed deportation proceedings, Deputy George Neilson, however, said he thought the burglar was a Canadian by certain words and expressions he used.

When he asked him about it, however, the youth declared he was a native of Topeka, Kan., Mr. Neilson said.

In an interview with the Mail Tribune, prior to his arrest, Whimster said he had been an aerial gunner with the Chinese army.

30 DAYS AND \$100 FOR DRUNK DRIVER

Doyle Charles Cowles, 35, local resident, entered a plea of guilty to driving an auto while intoxicated, and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail, fined \$100 and ordered his driver's license revoked for one year. In justice court this morning.

Cowles was arrested by city police Thursday when the auto he was driving struck William Coy, Southern Oregon Brewery company employe, while Coy's truck was parked on South Riverside avenue as he was making a delivery. Coy sustained back injuries.

W. S. Johnson, 24, liberated recently from the Josephine county jail, on a suspicious check charge, was sentenced to six months in the county jail when he entered a plea of guilty to petty larceny. Johnson stole a lawn mower belonging to Gilbert Stewart and sold it. It was charged.

According to authorities, Johnson has been in trouble before.

STATE BARBER BOARD FINDS DAHACK'S SHOP WORTHY OF LICENSE

The Eagle Point barber shop of Ernest Dahack was re-inspected Thursday by A. H. Zastrow of Grants Pass, vice-president of the Oregon state board of barber examiners, and the owner will be issued a shop license on Mr. Zastrow's recommendation, the examiner announced.

Mr. Zastrow stated that Dahack "passed a nice inspection."

It was erroneously stated yesterday that Dahack was tried in Grants Pass justice court on a charge of operating a barber shop on Sunday, winning an acquittal. Mr. Zastrow explained that Dahack was never tried on that charge, the case being dismissed in Medford justice court several months ago.

Mr. Zastrow stated that Dahack sued him in Josephine county circuit court in September, 1928, for \$8360 for false arrest, and that the jury returned a verdict in favor of Zastrow.

The reinspection of Dahack's shop yesterday was made upon the suggestion of Deputy District Attorney George W. Neilson that he be granted a license to operate a barber shop if an inspection warranted. Dahack had a license to barber, but not a license to operate a barber shop. He was indicted last March on a misdemeanor charge of operating a barber shop without a license, but a circuit court jury Monday evening returned an acquittal verdict.

TWO ARRESTED HERE RETURNED TO SOUTH

Two men held here for California authorities were returned yesterday on extradition papers.

They were: Charles E. Preston, alleged navy deserter, charged with the theft of an auto from Yreka, Calif., and Earl A. Kennedy, alias Cole, charged with the burglary of a San Francisco garage, and the theft of a custom-made auto.

Inspector C. P. Dunlevy of the San Francisco police department had charge of Kennedy, and Inspector Taylor of the Los Angeles department had custody of Stone.

FOUNDATION TESTED FOR IRRIGATION DAM

Work of drilling test holes on the Lake Creek side of the proposed dam, to provide additional water supplies for irrigation in this section, started the past week. Preliminary drilling tests on the Little Butte creek side have been completed. The work is under direction of the reclamation bureau.

The engineer in charge reports drilling and surveying work on the proposed project will be completed by July 1, after which there will be a considerable period devoted to map drawing, estimating, and other work.

BAD CHECK SUSPECT TAKEN OFF BUS HERE

State police last night arrested Barbara Wheeler, 24, of San Francisco at the Pacific Greyhound stage terminal and are holding her in the county jail for Sacramento authorities on a charge of obtaining money, under false pretenses. She is alleged to have passed bad checks in Sacramento.

State police said the women had waived extradition proceedings and would be returned to California by a Sacramento police officer.
