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Find Fortune In Safe Of Recluse

MASTONTOWN, Pa., June 11.—(AP)—A fortune which Attorney Dean D. Sturgis estimated "might reach \$500,000" was found in an old safe here after the death of a recluse who lived in a house without running water, electric lights or other conveniences.
State motor patrolman said the four heirs, Mrs. David Crans of Philadelphia and her three daughters, gazed at the door of the iron box belonging to the late Fred Schroyer, 72, was swung open by a locksmith.
Scores of \$1,000 bills, a mass of dusty liberty bonds and other negotiable securities were stacked neatly inside. Wild rumors placed the fortune in the "millions" but Sturgis said it would not exceed \$500,000.
Schroyer died May 31 in a Uniontown hospital, protesting against the ministrations of physicians treating him for diabetes.

Graham Auto To Quit Fall Claim

WASHINGTON, June 11.—(AP)—The federal trade commission said today the Graham-Paige Motors corporation, Detroit, had agreed to stop advertising that its automobile will go faster than any other car "in America."
The commission also announced that the company had agreed to cease representing that, because of the particular type of oil filter used in its cars, oil bills or changes will drop any fixed percentage.
"It agrees to stop representing its car as the official U. S. economy champion or otherwise implying that such car has been so designated by any branch of the U. S. government," the commission said.

CORVALLIS, June 11.—(AP)—Allan Parker, 16, Portland, won the Oregon championship of 4-H club public speakers today and will represent the state at the national conference of the American Institute for Cooperation at Pullman, Wash., next month.

AIRPLANE USE TO FIGHT FIRE EYED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—(AP)—The growing importance of airplanes in actually combatting forest fires came to light today in a report of S. B. Show, regional U. S. forester, of San Francisco.
Show said "preliminary experiments indicate that it is entirely practicable to fly over small fires even at high altitudes in rough country" and drop water and other fire retardants on the fire with a high degree of accuracy.
He said work thus far shows that continued experimentation during the current fire season is justified.

ADVERTISING AIDS HOME LOAN BANK

WASHINGTON, June 11.—(AP)—The Federal Home Loan bank review said today that savings and loan associations in many parts of the country had obtained exceptional expansion of their business by cooperative advertising in newspapers.
The review published a survey of a score of such campaigns. It said the public in the campaign areas had become "much more aware of the facilities and advantages of savings and loan association" and "an unusually large number of new savings accounts have been opened and many new home loans have been made."
"These campaigns reveal that effective cooperative advertising, like other advertising of financial institutions, is culminating in its effect," the review said. "A well planned, consistent program over a period of months succeeds, where sporadic and intensive campaigns of shorter duration have failed."
