SEATTLE, June 11.—(AP)—Washington state Republicans met in an harmonious five-hour state convention today and laid groundwork for a vigorous fall campaign, decriing the Democratic administration as one in which "danger signals are flying from the mastheads of all American institutions."

William F. Knowland, Oakland, Calif., publisher and national committee man, was the keynote speaker. Joseph M. Tewinkel, Spokane school teacher, served as temporary and permanent chairman.

Tewinkel gave a rousing speech which raised the delegates to enthusiasm.

"The Republican party are the shock troops in the last ditch," he shouted. "If we give up the fight, America will follow the lines of Greece and Rome."

### LAST RITES HELD ACCIDENT VICTIM

Funeral services were held in Grants Pass last Monday for Frank E. Ingram, Jr., son of Mrs. Edith Ingram of the Big Rock Lodge, Medford. He was killed in an automobile accident near Sacramento, Cal., June 3. Interment was made in the Hillcrest Memorial park.

Young Ingram, 20-year-old student at Sacramento Junior college, was killed when his car plunged over a 35-foot embankment about 20 minutes after he had left Sacramento for Medford. He was to have met his mother here and taken her to commencement exercises the same evening at Grants Pass high school, from which he had been graduated exactly a year from the day he met his death. The accident happened about 4 a. m. Frank had bought the car only a week before, especially for the trip home.

The youth was a freshman at the college. He made the varsity track team the first year and had made an excellent record as a javelin and discus thrower. He was born in Grants Pass March 23, 1915.

### MATTSON SUSPECT IS JAIL SUICIDE

CASCADE, Idaho, June 11.—(AP) Sheriff Robert L. Wilson reported tonight that "a suspect" in the Charles Mattson kidnap-slaying hanged himself in the Valley county jail today.

The officer identified the suicide as Thomas F. Lannon, 52, of Reno, Nev.

The Mattson boy, 10-year-old son of Dr. W. W. Mattson of Tacoma, was kidnaped Dec. 27, 1936, and his body was found Jan. 11, 1937. A \$28,000 ransom was asked.

Wilson said Lannon was arrested here May 15 on a morals charge. "After his fingerprints were examined," the sheriff said, "the federal bureau of investigation agents at Butte, Mont., instructed me to hold him on suspicion of being involved."

### FIVE DIE IN CRASH WYOMING FARM

WORLAND, Wyo., June 11.—(AP)—Four men and a woman were killed today when a plane piloted by William O. Bashaw, 34, Seattle, crashed on a root cellar of a farm near Worland, in north central Wyoming.

The dead, in addition to Bashaw, were: Miss Helen Brattus, Renton, Wash., who was traveling with Bashaw; Lloyd Paris, 28, Worland pilot; Wesley Bard, 28, Spokane; W. B. Bledsoe, Valley Falls, Kan.

Sheriff John Nicola said reports from witnesses indicated the plane's motor failed and caused it to go into a nose dive and crash onto the cellar on the farm of Charles Cavanaugh at the edge of Worland about 4 p. m.

### DEMOCRAT PARTY \$33,000 IN 'RED'

A report filed with the house clerk showed the committee had to supplement its income from cash donations and victory and Jackson day dinners with a \$25,000 bank loan.

The Republicans are better off. Their national committee told the house clerk yesterday it still had \$14,546 of \$52,193 contributed to it since January 1 and had pledges of \$69,513 more for this year's election wars.
