

# Chick and Sockeye to Meet in Climax of Grappling Feud Tonight

## FINISH MATCH TO DECIDE BEST MAN IN ARMORY ARENA

Cy Fox, Newcomer From Texas, Meets Floyd Britt in Middle Match—Morelli and Secret Will Open

The climax to one of wrestling's most bitter feuds is reached tonight when Sockeye Jack McDonald and Cowboy Dude Chick square off in the Medford armory in a no-time-limit, finish match.

After fighting two stupendous draws, one in January and the other last Monday night, the husky ex-lodger from Seattle and the world's junior heavyweight champion go to the post in a brawl that will determine once and for all which is the better man. They will grapple until one or the other obtains two falls, whether it takes all night or five minutes.

The epic match was closed only after Promoter Mack Lillard offered Champion Chick a big guarantee and a healthy percentage of the gross gate receipts. The promoter said today that advance reserved seats sales indicated a capacity crowd, and perhaps standing room only. Without doubt, it is the greatest "natural" to be staged here in three years.

Both wrestlers were confident of victory today; McDonald, the slugger and Boston crab expert planning to belt the champion into submission and Chick, the lariat-spinning exponent figuring to win because of better physical condition and with his payoff airplane whiff.

Cy Fox of Port Worth, Texas, a clean and scientific workman, makes his first local appearance in the middle event, facing Floyd Britt, master of the painful arm-breaker hold.

In the opener, Tony Morelli of Michigan, billed as a rather villainous performer, also show here for the first time. He faces the Black Dragon, hooded bad-man who has been unmasked twice.

Toy Aho of Finland will referee. The program starts at 8:30 sharp.

## CRATERS WIN, 17-6 IN BEEFING MATCH WITH ASHLANDERS

Long Game Marked by Crabbing at Umpires and Player Squabbles—Locals Have Batting Field Day

Medford and Ashland ball clubs put on another of their woody and hysterical Southern Oregon league encounters yesterday afternoon at the high school park, and after two hours and 35 minutes of beefing with the umpires, squabbling among the players and minor havoc-raising in general, the thing ended with the Craters on the top end of a 17 to 6 score. Their previous game ended 17 to 9, and was screwy, also.

By their win, the Craters took over the undisturbed league-lead, as Grants Pass lost to Crescent, 3 to 0. Umps Lew Miles and Darby O'Toole were picked on all afternoon, and twice it looked like a riot squad would be necessary to clear the field of swarming angry ball players. Most serious outbreak occurred in the fifth inning when Third Baseman Parker Hesa of Ashland thought he had tagged out Manager Wally Rickert of the Craters, and Umpire Miles thought otherwise. Peace was finally restored after Lathian players had milled around the official for several minutes without changing Miles' decision.

Pitchers Parade. Three Ashland pitchers paraded to the mound and their teammates committed 11 errors in the wild fray. Clay Lewis started the affair, but was yanked in the first inning after four walks and Tommy White's single scored two runs. Johnny Schonneker lasted until two were out in the third, giving up five runs, and Crick finished the game for the Lithians.

Southpaw Lowell Brown won his third league game of the year for Medford, but was treated roughly. Ashland found him for nine hits and all their runs in his six frames of toil. Bill Rathke hurled ruffless ball in the seventh, eighth and ninth.

The crashing Craters scored in every inning but the eighth. White Leads Hitting. Tommy White blasted a homer in the fourth with the bases empty, and singled in the first and seventh, both times with the bases loaded, to lead the Crater attack, batting in five runs and scoring three, himself. Rickert also collected three hits, including a triple, and Billy Calvert rapped three line-drive singles.

Ted Schopf hit two doubles and a single for the Lithians. The Lithians scored in the first inning on Schopf's double and Patterson's single, got two more in the fourth on Hesa's single, Schonneker's double, a passed ball and an error, and wound up their tallying in the fifth on two errors by Rickert and lead singles by Hesa, Patterson and Leavens, good for three markers.

Inning by inning, here is how the Craters reached home plate: First—White singled to center scoring Rickert and Hoffard, who had walked. Second—Calvert singled, Rickert tripled him across, and Rickert scored on Lewis' outfield fly.

Third—White reached first on an error, Ager singled, Brown singled, Calvert got on by a fielders' choice and Rickert singled. Three runs.

Fourth—White socked a home run to deep centerfield.

Fifth—Brown, Calvert, Rickert and Lewis all scored on a walk and four errors, two by Bauding and one each by Hall and Patterson.

Sixth—Smith reached first on a fielders' choice, went to third on Ager's single, and scored on Calvert's one-base blast to left.

Seventh—Rickert singled to right, Lewis was safe on Hesa's error, Hoffard was safe on Schopf's error, leading the bats, and White hit a steaming single to centerfield, scoring Rickert and Lewis. Hoffard and White scored on another error by Hesa. Four runs.

Next Sunday, the Craters travel to Grants Pass.

## SPORTSMAN'S PROTEST CUTS EXHIBITION FUND

PORTLAND, June 13.—(AP)—Because of protests received from individual sportsmen and sportsmen's organizations against a big appropriation of state game funds for a San Francisco fair exhibit, the state game commission Saturday decided to limit tax expenditure to \$3000 or less.

The commission had been expected to contribute \$50,000 toward an Oregon exhibit. The commission tabled a proposal to establish an open season on band-tail pigeons, pending a conference with the federal biological survey, and agreed to take over a 10-acre tract offered in Jackson county by the federal government as an egg-taking station.

## SALEM MAN BEST ALL-AROUND SHOT IN STATE TOURNEY

Dr. C. G. Robertson Breaks 241 Out of Possible 250 Targets to Edge Out Veteran Frank Troeh.

BEND, June 13.—(AP)—Breaking 241 out of a possible 250 targets, Dr. C. G. Robertson, Salem, captured the all-around trapshooting championship of Oregon Sunday, edging out the veteran Frank Troeh, Portland, by three birds.

The all-around title was based on performances in the singles, handicap and doubles. Troeh won the title in the 16-yard division after a shootout with A. G. Gower, La Grande, and O. G. Hilderbrand, Wasco. They ended the regular shooting tied at 198 each but Troeh ran out a 25-bird string, Gower getting 24 for second place.

In the handicap contest, D. C. Fish, Portland, won with 97 targets from the 22-yard line, with A. R. Parrott, Portland, second. H. Carlisle had the high gun but his Salt Lake City residence made him ineligible for the award.

Cal Ray, Coos county, won the doubles with Dr. Robertson second. In the 16-yard, 100-bird event, seven tied with perfect scores of 100. Among them were Troeh, F. G. Mausser, Seaside, and C. C. Pollette, Cottage Grove, while Dr. Robertson, J. B. Troeh, Eugene, and W. Wain, Salem, each scored 99.

The junior championship went to Clair Miller, Corvallis, who shot 97 out of a possible 100.

In a business session following the championships, Dr. J. C. Vanoverst was elected president of the Oregon State Trapshooting association and the 1939 shoot was awarded to Portland. Among directors chosen were C. J. Hiltbrand, Salem, S. G. Mendenhall, Grants Pass, Ray Glass, Eugene, and Angus McAllister, La Grande.

## SILVERTON WIN STRING IN GOLF TOURNAMENT

PORTLAND, June 13.—(AP)—Victor in four straight games, Silverton's club in the state baseball league dropped its first battle Sunday, losing to Albany, 10-5.

Portland drubbed Eugene, 7-1, while Hill's Creek was knocked from a second place tie by Toledo, whose club moved out of the cellar with a 2-1 victory, leaving Eugene the sole resident of last place. The Drakes have yet to win a game.

SEATTLE, June 13.—(P)—Former Federal Agent Edwin Atherton, who is conducting a survey of athletic conditions at Pacific Coast conference schools, revealed the report he will make to the conference officials during their two-day spring session opening here today, will "contain nothing sensational."

Atherton said his first trip around the conference was merely in the form of a preliminary survey, principally for the purpose of getting acquainted with coaches, athletes and school officials.

He will make his report to the conference survey committee and will then "get down to business" surveying financial aid to athletes and athletes' income during their college days.
