Carrying the role of favorite, the tall, stoop-shouldered Texan is seeking an honor no golfer has ever achieved—three time straight winner of the western—against a big brigade of campaigners. Ralph came to St. Louis yesterday, just two days after he had successfully defended his United States open title in a stretch scoring jamboree at Denver.

OAK GROVE REGION WILL VOTE ON USE OF CITY'S WATER

A special election has been called for Monday, June 20, to vote upon the incorporation of the Jacksonville highway water district and the formation of a water district for the procurement and purchase of Medford city water for domestic purposes. At the same time, three water district commissioners will be chosen. The candidates named by petitions of residents of the district are Paul Janney, L. Pennington, James A. Neff and E. G. Trowbridge.

The district, a suburban area generally known as the Oak Grove section, extends from the western city limits to Perrydale, east and west, and north and south along Louisa lane.

Polling place for the special election will be the Oak Grove school. The questions of bonds for the proposed water district will be voted upon at another special election, if necessary.

According to City Water Superintendent R. A. Duff, the project if approved by the voters, would require about 15,000 lineal feet of water pipe and serve not less than 100 homes.

The water, according to Superintendent Duff, would be sold by the city in wholesale lots, through a master meter.

FAMED ASTRONOMER ENDS LIFE BY LEAP FROM S. F. APARTMENT

SAN FRANCISCO, June 14.—(AP)—Dr. William Wallace Campbell, 75, regarded as one of the world's greatest astronomers, committed suicide today, Coroner T. B. W. Leland reported by leaping three stories from a window of his apartment.

Coroner Leland said Dr. Campbell left five notes and that his son, Wallace, ascribed the act to ill health.

Dr. Campbell, former president of the University of California, and once a director of Lick Observatory, lived with his wife in the apartment house since his retirement.

Wallace Campbell said his father appeared in cheerful spirits last night when he retired.

A newsboy, passing the apartment house early today, found the body. Dr. Campbell had slipped a suit on over his pajamas and evidently had jumped from a ledge.

CHEAP POWER IS PROMISE AT DAM

PORTLAND, June 14.—(AP)—Small industries, as well as large, may locate near Bonneville dam and obtain the benefit of cheap power, a study of the federal power commission's action on Administrator J. D. Ross' proposed rate schedule showed today.

A minimum purchase provision was removed, allowing the purchase of power in quantities as low as one kilowatt year within a radius of 15 miles of the dam.

Ross previously proposed an industry contracting rate for at-site power of not less than 2500 kilowatts of prime power at \$14.50 a kilowatt year. He suggested limitation of secondary power at \$9.50 a kilowatt year to not more than the prime purchase.

MISSING MOTOR CRUISER FOUND BY GUARD PLANE ASTORIA, June 14.—(AP)—The 45-foot motor cruiser Beverly B. missing since last Friday noon, was located yesterday by a coast guard amphibian plane, beating northward 28 miles south of Tillamook bay.

The pilot said the cruiser seemed to be in no trouble. Coast guardsmen believed the captain of the boat, owned by H. L. Beverly, Portland oil company salesman, had missed the entrance to the Columbia river.

ADMITS FORGERY IN HEIRESS POSE

NEW YORK, June 14.—(AP)—A plea of guilty to a forgery charge was made yesterday in general sessions court by Mrs. Muriel DuPont Bergman, who was arrested in Portland, Ore.

Mrs. Bergman admitted posing as the daughter of the late General T. Coleman DuPont, once United States senator from Delaware. Frank Seitz and his wife, Marie, Portland, said they gave Mrs. Bergman their life savings, after they took her, destitute, into their home in 1931.

She lived there six years, and the complaint alleged the money was obtained on the strength of a letter

purporting to show Mrs. Bergman to be an heiress of General DuPont's estate, estimated between \$18,000,000 and \$40,000,000.

The complaint charged the letter bore a forged signature of Surrogate James A. Foley, Judge James G. Wallace set June 27 for sentencing.

SEATTLE, June 14.—(AP)—A plan, the faculty committee of the Pacific Coast conference hopes will satisfy the public and the alumni, will be worked out for the ticket distribution for the next Pasadena Rose Bowl football classic.
