

COOPERATION OF LABOR, INDUSTRY PROSPERITY NEED

Pull Together Seen As Most Important Requirement for Return of Nation to Former Good Times.

DETROIT, June 16.—(AP)—A program of co-operation between labor and industry as a means of averting industrial warfare was urged today by Lewis G. Hines, organizational director of the American Federation of Labor.

In an address prepared for delivery before the annual meeting of the Advertising Federation of America, Hines said:

"We believe that co-operation between labor and industry can do more than anything else to bring this nation back to a prosperous condition."

Industrial Symposium.

Hines' address was made at an industrial symposium at which Bennett Chapple, vice-president of the American Rolling Mill company, also spoke.

Chapple said, "This nation is richly endowed with all the essential requirements * * * for industrial progress except one, and that is understanding."

He asserted "the time has come" for industry "to open wide its gates and let the public know what goes on inside the factory walls."

W. J. Cameron of the Ford Motor company recommended to the advertisers this afternoon a study of the state of mind in Canada.

"Canada," he said, "knows it has a Canadian government at Ottawa, not exiled Russians or men with collapsed ideas from overseas, and that it has a premier who doesn't grab at new social systems overnight or jam the Kingdom of Heaven through parliament before adjournment."

Radio Censors Advised.

Radio broadcasters were told by Edgar Kobak, vice-president of Lord & Thomas, New York, to tighten censorship and pioneer new programs.

Speaking at a meeting of the National Association of Broadcasters, meeting in conjunction with the advertisers, he said, "the very structure of business seems to be under fire" but assured broadcasters that if they tune their programs to public taste "the independence of the radio industry can be preserved."

Donald R. Richberg, former NRA administrator, urged industry, labor and government today "to cease warfare and sit down around the council tables of peace."

"In all three groups," he told the Advertising Federation of America, "are exceedingly active and aggressive warmakers who want no peace unless they can dictate the terms."

"Some of these," he continued, "are hard-headed zealots who honestly believe that government or management or labor must boss the economic system. Some are narrow-minded, unscrupulous self-seekers who, in their desire for power or money, are ruthless enemies of any opposing private or public interest."

"It is the public clamor and the private intrigues of these war-makers that break down every effort to draw peace-loving men together in a joint adventure of public service."

Age of Confusion.

Richberg asserted an economic constitution was needed to maintain a competitive system of private enterprise.

"We live in an age of confusion and insecurity," he said. "It becomes more and more difficult for government to preserve the peace as more and more people go to quarreling over how they should develop and control their common enterprises and how they should share the products."

"At the same time, millions and millions of people, suffering from unemployment and inadequate rewards of labor, become much more interested in changing the rules of the game than in preserving either peace or fair play. * * *

"What we need today is an economic constitution—a declaration of those fundamental principles under which a democratic people can maintain a competitive system of private enterprise that will offer to every person capable of self-respect the opportunity to earn a decent livelihood."

Buy Surplus Flour For Needy Families

WASHINGTON, June 16.—(AP)—The surplus commodities corporation announced today the purchase of

914,900 barrels of flour at a cost of about \$4,200,000 from millers in virtually all sections of the country for distribution among needy families.

This acquisition was in addition to 134,000 barrels bought several weeks ago.

F. R. Wilcox, vice-president of the corporation, said the purchase program was designed "primarily to

relieve temporary market distress and to increase use of wheat, of which there is a large surplus."
