

CAPITOL READY FOR OCCUPANCY AHEAD OF TIME

New Structure To Be Turned Over To State Next Tuesday—Martin Eager To Enter New Office.

By PAUL W. HARVEY, Jr. SALEM, June 17.—(AP)—Only a year ago this week Gov. Charles H. Martin laid the cornerstone for Ore-

gon's new capitol, built to replace the old structure destroyed by fire two years ago. Next Tuesday, six months ahead of schedule, the \$2,500,000 marble statehouse will be turned over to the state, and it will be occupied July 1. State officials are so anxious to move into the new building that they are acting like schoolboys waiting for summer vacation. Governor Martin, however, is the most eager of any officials to move into his new quarters. The white-haired executive, who has only six more months in office, said he would move in on July 1 even if he has "to sit on a nail barrel and use a box for a desk." To Use Old Furniture The new furniture will not be delivered until September, but state departments will use their old furniture in the meantime. On June 30 the state highway

commission will meet in Portland to open bids for the widening of Court street in front of the capitol. The new capitol is only a part of the state's building program here. Work is proceeding rapidly on the \$1,000,000 library, contractors believing they will finish the job long before the January 1 deadline. In three months the \$125,000 forestry building near the penitentiary will be completed. Political news during the hot months will be at a premium, most candidates planning to begin their general election campaigns in late September. There are some reports that the governor, who will be 75 in October, will run for congress in the third (Multnomah county) district against Homer Angell, Republican, and Rep. Nan Wood Honeyman, Democrat. There also are rumors he will

run for governor against Charles A. Sprague, Republican, and Henry Hess, Democrat, despite a law which prevents a defeated primary candidate from running for the same office as an independent. Supporters of the governor have been high-pressureing him to run for governor in November by attempting to have the law declared unconstitutional. Proponents of public utility districts, which so far have not proved very popular with Oregon citizens, received a setback this week when Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle gave an opinion as to the hydro-electric commission's authority under the PUD law. If the majority of the voters of a proposed district reject the proposal, districts cannot be formed out of municipalities voting in favor of it. If the majority approves the district the commission still has au-

thority to prevent the district's formation. The commission also can eliminate from an approved district any municipality regardless of whether the voters of the municipality want to be included in the district. Mrs. Clara Patterson, head of the girls' industrial school here, sprung a surprise on the board of control and newsmen when she had them out for a chicken dinner this week.
