

VACATION CAMP FOR HOUSEWIVES OPENS JULY 31

Inexpensive, Restful And Instructive Time Planned At Lake Of Woods—Enrollment Closes July 9.

The annual Jackson-Klamath county Homemakers Vacation Camp will be held at Lake of the Woods, July 31 to August 6, Mabel C. Mack, county home demonstration agent announced today. This will be the third annual camp for Jackson county homemakers and the second joint camp for the two counties.

The camp, which provides an inexpensive but entirely restful and refreshing vacation for homemakers, is sponsored by the Oregon extension service. Cost is kept to the minimum that will make the camp self-supporting and part of this may be paid with farm produce which can be used in camp. Any woman over 18 years may enroll but it is essential that those planning to attend should sign up promptly at the office of the home demonstration agent. Enrollment from Jackson county is limited to 40 and enrollment closes July 9. Homemakers attending the camp have no dishes to wash, no meals to prepare, no work at all. In fact, except to make up their own beds. The camp will be staffed with a director, assistant director, cook and helpers, registered nurse, life guard, librarian and chore boys. The program includes crafts, music, fireside programs, swimming and hiking and lots of rest.

Mack, county home demonstration agent, to Klamath Falls last Monday to confer with the Klamath county camp committee and plan for the joint vacation camp. The committee members are taking enrollments in their respective communities, and can give full information regarding the camp arrangements. 20-DAY SCHEDULE ROUND THE WORLD IS AIR LINES AIM

LONDON (UP)—Travelers soon may be able to fly around the world by normal air services in 20 days. The possibility is forehanded in plans now being perfected by Imperial Airways and their associated companies throughout the empire. The plans are the most ambitious air developments yet devised for a globe round the earth. The first important move will be made within the next month or so when Mercury, the first of the flying-boat Maits, will start the regular trans-Atlantic service between Foyens, Eire, and Botwood, Newfoundland.

In the other direction, new type flying boats will leave Southampton and base an empire trail across Egypt, Palestine, Iraq, Arabia, India, Burma and Malaya to Australia. The new Tasman route will then be established, flying-boat making the 1,100-mile sea crossing between Brisbane and Auckland, New Zealand. From Auckland flying history will be made when the giant boats take off on a new route across the Pacific ocean to San Francisco. From there the route will extend to Vancouver. Here, land planes will wait for mails and passengers and be flown by trans-Canada machines to Montreal, where they will link up with the Atlantic services. By August, eight of the secret 25-ton flying-boats will be delivered for a series of test flights before they are put into regular service in the "round the world" program. They will have new type tanks, improved wireless equipment and many other up-to-date devices.

ARMY, NAVY TRY DIESEL ENGINES FOR PLANE USE

TULSA, Okla.—(UP)—Rapid development and improvement of Diesel engines, which during the past two years have taken over many of the power jobs formerly held exclusively by steam or gasoline motors, was shown at the International Petroleum Exposition here.

Diesels have become more versatile because methods have been found for paring down their weight and for removing the highly objectionable smoke and fumes which formerly presented a major problem. At one time, Diesels weighed too much and smelled too strongly to be used in automobiles or airplanes. Today, hundreds of pounds lighter and free of fumes, they are coming into wider use.

Aero Diesels probably are the latest development in the field. Relatively free from fire hazards, the rotary-type engines are considerably more economical than gasoline engines of similar power.

One airplane engine, recently out of a 10-year experimental period, now is being manufactured under governmental limitations for use by the army and navy. The engine is rated at 320 horsepower, delivering one horsepower for each 1.94 pounds of weight. It weighs only 620 pounds, suitable for airplanes, and will run twice as long on the same amount of fuel as a gasoline engine of equal power and weight.

Diesels burn a cheap fuel oil, making it cost approximately one-fourth the price of gasoline. Diesel engines are less complicated than gasoline motors. No ignition system (batteries, spark plugs, wiring, etc.) is used.

Reduced to its simplest form, the action of a Diesel engine is a series of spontaneous combustions. Air is drawn into the combustion chamber on the intake stroke of the piston. The piston comes up, compresses the air, and fuel oil is sprayed into the cylinder, where it ignites from the heat of compression and furnishes the power impulse.

Use of strong, light alloys has resulted in development of the smaller, lighter engines suitable for mobile units. Formerly, the engines were too heavy for any but stationary uses since the cylinders had to be built of heavy steel to withstand the terrific pressures necessary for operation.

NEW NAZI GAME GIVES MILITARY TOUCH TO CHESS

BERLIN—"Tactica," a new militarized kind of chess, is being played by Nazis, young and old, in Hitler's Reich.

Produced under army auspices, the game, it is asserted, "develops tactical and strategic thinking" and "instills qualities of modern leadership."

"Tactica" is played between "red" and "blue" forces on a board of 121 squares instead of the traditional 64.

Each side plays 18 pieces: six infantrymen; four artillery figures (battalions); three tanks; two bombing planes; two pursuit planes; and the main piece—a symbolic eagle, so checkmate which is the aim of opposing players.

Pieces can be moved along diagonals, indicating strategic lines such as highways and railroads, complicated by "barred" areas representing lakes or watercourses.

Different rules apply to each move. The soldierman never moves one square in any direction; tanks up to three squares (or may move as knights do in ordinary chess); artillery up to four squares, and planes up to five.

Capturing powers are very intricate. Thus, an enemy piece may be taken by forward, backward or sideways movement, never diagonally. Planes may jump over all other pieces, except enemy artillery or enemy planes.

All pieces may move across a river, but not along its banks—planes alone excepted. Lake sections may not be occupied or crossed. Planes may cross, but not "occupy."

Artillery may capture any piece across others, but does not take its victim's place.

And so on. The winner is the side which "checkmates" the other's eagle, or "kills" all the opponent's infantry, or reaches the third enemy line with no fewer than five pieces, not including planes; or, when the opponent has no more than five artillery and tank pieces left.

Scores of German papers run a regular military chess corner. The German labor front encouraged the game from the beginning, and instituted a regular course of instruction for the game. In the first six months of its existence, 75,000 sets were sold, its promoters said.

Daubed With Paint

WORCESTER, Mass.—(UP)—When Peter Nelson, 72-year-old handyman, awakened from a long nap on an outdoor bench, he found someone had painted his arms, face and neck with bright green paint. Unable to remove the paint which had hardened, he was taken to city hospital where doctors and nurses worked for more than an hour to remove the glassy coat.

Oregon Sterilizes 1,218

SALEM (UP)—During the past 21 years Oregon has sterilized 1,218 insane and feeble-minded persons, the state health board reports. The board said one reason Oregon adopted a eugenics law was "because the families that contribute children to the state home for feeble-minded are multiplying about twice as rapidly as the rest of the population."

Grabs Fender, Lives

CLEVELAND (UP)—Little Phyllis Vericho, 4, is still alive because she grabbed the fender of a moving automobile that bore down on her and clung to it until the car stopped. She escaped with minor injuries.

Quick Coffee Bread.

3 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup granulated sugar
4 tablespoons fat
1 egg
1/4 cup milk
Mix flour with baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in fat with a knife. Pat out soft dough until it is half an inch thick. Spread with filling. Fold half-over and carefully place on a greased baking pan. Sprinkle top with half cup of brown sugar mixed with one teaspoon of cinnamon.

Filling.

1/2 cup brown sugar
3 tablespoons fat
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup raisins
1 tablespoon orange juice
Mix ingredients and spread on the soft dough. When folded over, bake for 20 minutes in a moderate oven. Cut into bars and serve hot.

Corn Fritters.

1 1/2 cups canned corn
1 cup boiled rice
1 cup flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon granulated sugar
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon chopped parsley
2 eggs or 4 yolks
1/4 cup milk
5 tablespoons fat
Mix corn, rice and dry ingredients. Add eggs and milk. Beat well and drop from a teaspoon into fat heated in a frying pan. When well puffed on top turn the fritters to allow the underneath sides to brown.

Spiders in Jelly Exported
