FINAL RITES SET FOR C. T. HUME, 75

Funeral services for Clinton Taylor Hume, 75, who died suddenly at 8:15 p. m. Thursday in his home at Milestone street, will be conducted at the Peri funeral home Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Rev. D. E. Millard officiating. Interment will take place in Mountain View cemetery.

Mr. Hume was born May 18, 1863, at Lincoln, Ohio, and had been a resident of Medford for the past five years. As an editor, publisher, writer of western stories and a railway auditor, he led an interesting and colorful life, and was a member of the International Typographical Union for 35 years. Among the large newspapers for which he worked were the Omaha Bee, Council Bluffs Nonpareil; he was a correspondent for the New York Sun for many years and was publisher and editor of the Sumpter (Ore.) Miner and the Baker Democrat-Herald. Much of his life was spent in the west during the eighties and early nineties.

He is survived by his wife, and three daughters, Mrs. V. E. Drisdler of Oroville, Wash., Mrs. J. K. Buchanan of Eugene, and Miss June Hume of Cristobal, Canal Zone. Also, one granddaughter, Peggy Jean Nagel.

Stanley Mayer, 37, of Reno, Nev., arrested in Grants Pass Friday on a federal charge of transportation of an auto in interstate commerce, was bound over to the federal grand jury in lieu of \$2500 bail by U. The 75,000 parasitized earwigs, purchased from the City of Portland by the City of Medford to eradicate the pests here, will arrive the latter part of this month, according to a letter received yesterday by City Superintendent Fred Scheffel from E. G. Gavin, insectarian at Portland.

Mr. Gavin stated that the parasitized earwigs, which are developed by hand by Oregon State college students, were in great demand in all parts of the state, so much so that many cities would not be able to have their orders filled by the time specified. 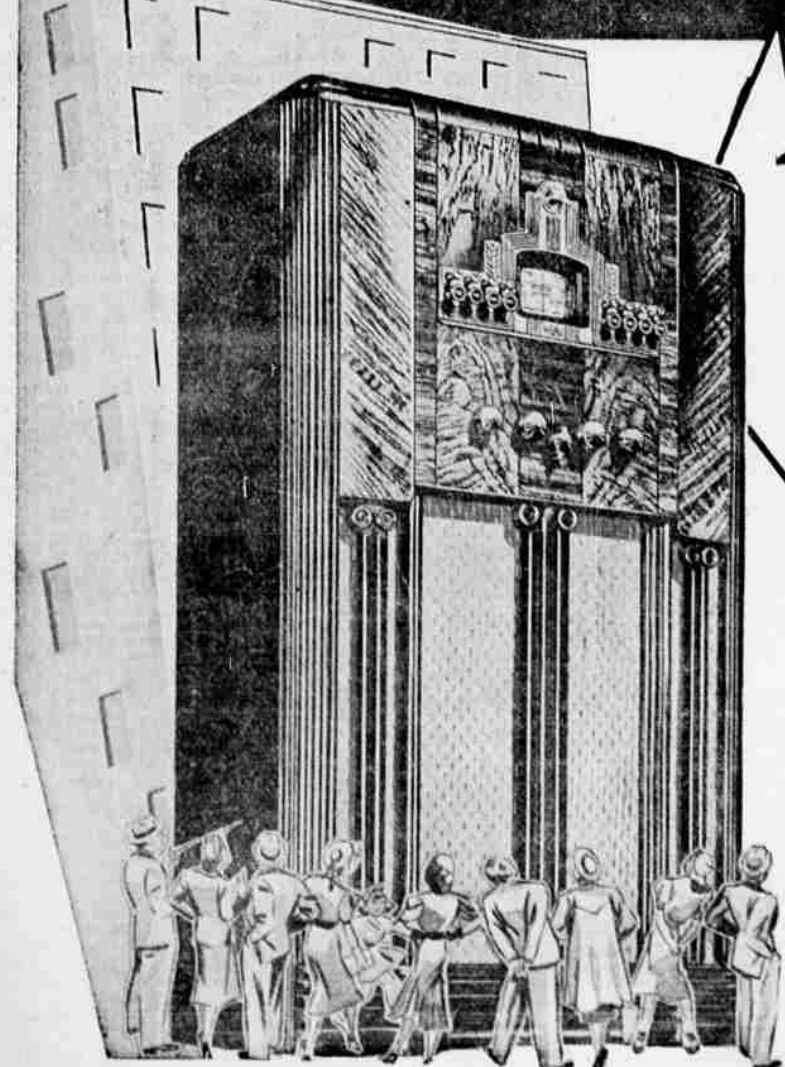
Special music will be provided by the choir of the church in charge of the service. The public in general is cordially invited to share in these union services of Medford churches.
