HONEYMOON PAIR ON SECLUDED ISLE

CAMPBELL ISLAND, N. B. June 20.—(AP)—Another pair of honeymooning Roosevelt found refuge today on this Canadian island where the president spent much of his youth.

John Roosevelt, fourth and youngest son of the president, and his bride, the former Anne Lindsay Clark, followed the course taken a year ago by Franklin, Jr., and Ethel Du Pont Roosevelt in coming to the seclusion of the president's rambling cottage. It faces the American shore across an arm of Passamaquoddy bay.

John and Anne asked and got the privacy they wanted after the tumult of a fashionable wedding at Nahant, Mass. John said he and his bride would remain here a month before going to Quebec City to board the Canadian liner Lady Somerset for a west Indies cruise.

JAPS TO EXPAND CHINA WAR ZONE

TOKYO, June 20.—(AP)—Japan today notified neutral powers that the China war zone probably would be considerably expanded and warned them to take precautionary measures in a vast area extending some 700 miles inland from China's coasts.

SHANGHAI, June 20.—(AP)—Striking both from land and air, the Japanese today sought to blast out the barricade of rock-laden boats at Matsowen which is blocking their drive up the Yangtze river to Hankow.

While Japanese planes continued to bombard the boom, an overland column forced the swollen Tamen river and marched into Hotow, 30 miles northwest of Matsowen, threatening a rear attack against Chinese forces guarding the barrier.

Adapted from Erich Maria Remarque's best-seller novel of European post-war chaos, "Three Comrades," which opened at the Craterian theater yesterday, presents Robert Taylor, Margaret Sullivan, Franchot Tone and Robert Young in one of the most touching love stories to reach the screen.

FIND ROGUE FREE FROM FISH NETS

GRANTS PASS, June 20.—(AP)—Although five arrests for illegal snagging of salmon were made, state police have found no evidence of netting in the Grants Pass section of the Rogue River. Governor Charles H. Martin has advised C. R. Brundage of Grants Pass.

In answer to a petition aroused by reports of many net-marked salmon, the governor turned the matter to state police, working both in uniform and in plain clothes.

"Their report," the governor wrote, "concludes with the following statement: 'During our stay in that vicinity, we could find no evidence to justify the rumor of extensive illegal net fishing on the river.'"

An unprecedented number of sea lions at the mouth of the Rogue have ripped and torn many salmon this year, according to reports from Gold Beach.
