Clark Turns in 77 in Qualifying Round — Don Moe Burns Waverly Course to Lead Parade With 69

PORTLAND, June 21.—(AP)—Don Moe, Walker cup team alternate, scored the Waverly golf course yesterday with a three under par 69 to lead qualifiers in the Pacific Northwest Golf association tournament.

Moe, present or former holder of almost every other northwest golfing title, was one stroke ahead of Harry Givan, Seattle, defending champion. Dr. O. F. Willing, veteran Walker cup player, followed Givan with a 72, even par.

A 73 put Dr. Cliff Baker, Portland, in fourth position, followed by Jack Westland, Seattle, and Malcolm MacNaughton, San Francisco, tied with 74.

Powerful Paper Opposes Holding Tokyo Olympics

NEW YORK, June 21.—(AP)—The New York Times, in its leading editorial today, came out in opposition to United States participation in the 1940 Olympic games in Tokyo.

Raising the question as to whether the games "actually do" promote peace and good-will, the newspaper says: "Peace and good-will were not promoted by the Berlin meetings (in 1936) even though the German government saw to it that the groans of the victims in the concentration camps were not audible to the Olympic spectators. Peace and good-will will not be prompted by the Tokyo meetings, even though, as one Japanese spokesman put it, 'the struggle in China has no bearing on the situation; the conflict is being carried on far away.'"

NEW YORK, June 21.—(AP)—Max Schmeling, bronzed and ready after five weeks of hard training in the mountains, comes into town today for the crucial fight of his long career, tomorrow night's 15-round tussle with heavyweight champion Joe Louis at the Yankee stadium.

It will be a far different entry from that of two years ago when the German schlager came in for his first bout with the wonder negro. On that occasion the odds were 6-to-1 and up that Schmeling was a goner.

This time he comes as the proud, confident conqueror, certain that by midnight tomorrow he will be hailed to the four corners of the earth as the first man ever to regain the heavyweight title. He knocked the young Negro out in the 12th round of their first meeting, and he means to do it again before an expected throng of 75,000, and a \$900,000 "house."

Favor Negro Again
Again the weight of expert opinion is against the 32-year-old German, but only in a slight degree by comparison with the 1936 fight, when Max was almost alone in predicting his victory. This time a comprehensive poll of experts reveals that about 40 per cent of them like his chances.

Schmeling is making the five-hour trip from Pompton by automobile and train arriving here at 10 tonight.

Louis, unless he changes his plans, will not motor in from Pompton lakes until he goes to the commission office for the official weigh-in at noon tomorrow.

For once, there are no reports that either fighter has injured a hand in training, or in any way off his feed. Dr. William Walker of the boxing commission, has pronounced the pair in perfect condition.

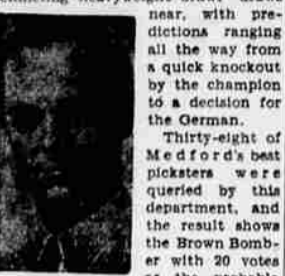
