NEW YORK, June 21.—(AP)—Stocks hit the rallying road at a fast pace today, with leading industrial climbing one to three points generally and a few isolated issues up as much as 10 at the best.

The list encountered frequent profit-taking handicaps, in the wake of Monday's surprisingly sharp run-up, and there was a ebbing off from top levels in the final hour, but most favorites closed well in front.

The apparent break in the long market drought was attributed to an assortment of moderately optimistic factors, the principal one being a switch in speculative psychology from the depths of gloom to hopefulness as a change for the better is on the way for business and industry.

Short covering by nervous traders who found stocks hard to buy in the preceding session helped bolster the list. Large purchasing orders from abroad—these having been scarce in the past several weeks—were in evidence, and there were signs of investment nibbling from different sources.

The transfers approximated 1,400,000 shares, the best turnover since March. Today's closing prices for 32 selected stocks follow:
