

Louis Has 5 1/2 Pound Edge, Shown at Official Weighing Ceremony

CHAMPION SCALES 198 3-4 POUNDS; MAX WEIGHS 193

Principals Have Little to Say During Meeting — German Fighter Surprised by Own Lack Poundage

NEW YORK, June 22.—(AP)—Joe Louis weighed 198 3/4 pounds today for his 15-round heavyweight title bout against Max Schmeling in the Yankee Stadium tonight. Schmeling, the German challenger, scaled 193.

Nearly 700 newspapermen and photographers witnessed the weighing. There was little or no conversation between the two as they stepped on the scales with lights playing down on the principals.

Schmeling arrived five minutes ahead of the scheduled time, at noon, (eastern standard) but was kept waiting for twenty minutes by the negro champion who failed to put in an appearance until 12:15.

Schmeling was surprised at his own poundage. He had expected to come in at not less than 195 pounds. Louis' handlers had predicted the champion would hit 199 and he missed it by only a quarter-pound.

FERGUSON WILL FILE NOMINATION PETITION AS REED SUCCESSOR

W. A. Ferguson of Gold Hill intends to file his nomination petition today for justice of the peace for the Gold Hill district, the district attorney's office reported.

The county court at its regular meeting today will give consideration to the matter. Deputy District Attorney George W. Neilson said he would advise the county court, the law requires that justice of the peace appointments be made by the governor.

Ferguson has been a resident of Gold Hill for several years, and formerly was janitor of the Gold Hill school.

The vacancy in the office was caused by the passing of H. D. Reed, former justice. Besides Ferguson, there were three other applicants, including Mrs. Nellie G. Reed and John Hamersley of Gold Hill. Hamersley withdrew after presenting his nomination.

The governor's appointment will only be for the unexpired term, which ends next January 1.

The Gold Hill justiceship is a fixed office and because of its geographical location, saves the expense of transporting cases from the north end of the county to the Medford court.

PORTLAND, June 22.—(AP)—A shoulder injury removed Harry Givan, of Seattle, the defending champion, from the Pacific northwest golf association tournament at the Waverley Country club today.

The young player, who shot a two-under-par in a practice round Monday, said his shoulder had not responded to a day of rest. He was not on the course yesterday.

As titlist it was not necessary for Givan to compete in the 36-hole qualifying round.
