NEW YORK, June 22.—(AP)—S.E. Street's rejuvenated bulls kept securities prices on a brisk advance for the third successive day today.

The buying movement became the broadest and most active in months, and boosted the average level of share prices to the highest since mid-March.

Net gains in stocks of \$1 to more than \$5 a share were numerous at the close, marking many of the extreme gains for the three-day upswing \$5 to more than \$10.

The recently depressed railroad lens led the upswing in bonds, several advancing \$20 to \$30 per \$1000 bond.

Brokers said further business reports and statistics, showing slight stirrings of activity, appeared to have touched off the buying wave.

Early reports of freight movement last week indicated another gain. Buying was reported more active in the Worth street textile markets.

"Iron Age" said the steel industry was turning to the view summer production would not be as slack as expected. Prices for lead, zinc, scrap steel, and export copper were firmer.

The turnover in the stock exchange approximated 1,900,000 shares, best since late March.
