

BOY'S LEG BROKEN WHEN BICYCLE HIT BY FENDER OF CAR

Robert Littrell, 13-year-old-son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Littrell of Ross Lane, sustained a compound fracture of the right leg yesterday afternoon at 4:30 when the bicycle he was riding was struck by a taxicab driven by Frank M. Dupray of 1240 North Riverside avenue, at the intersection of Main street and Central avenue.

Robert was resting easily in Community hospital today, his badly torn and broken leg in a fracture frame, his attending physician reported. It will be placed in a cast later, after long gashes, made by shattered bones protruding through the flesh, have healed. Both front and back bones were broken just above the ankle. With the exception of bruises, he received no other injuries.

According to investigating city police officers, the accident occurred when young Littrell, riding his bicycle west on Main street, attempted to make a left hand turn into South Central avenue. The taxicab, traveling east on Main street, struck the rear wheel of the bicycle, throwing Robert into the air and over the curb at the southeast corner of the intersection. City police reported.

Dupray, who was not held by police, said in his accident report that Robert made a sudden left turn in front of him, and in trying to avoid hitting the bicycle broadside, he pulled to the left and caught the bike's rear wheel with his right hand fender.

Dr. C. W. Lemery, standing on the corner at the time the accident occurred, rushed to the boy and placed a splint on his shattered leg. The splint was made from a piece of linoleum, furnished by an unidentified bystander. Robert was then taken to the hospital in the taxicab.

NEW YORK, June 23.—(AP)—A mobile television transmitter making street shots in the vicinity of Rockefeller Center picked up an unprecedented scene today—a girl's body hurtling from the 11th floor of the lofty Time and Life building.

The set was being tested and its output was not on the air, although it was being fed by cable into the National Broadcasting company studios where engineers sat horrified.

The girl was identified tentatively as Marian Perloff of Brooklyn. It was reported she had fallen from a window of Girl Scout headquarters.

BOY SEVERELY BURNED PLAYING WITH MATCHES

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 23.—(AP)—Charles Cooper, 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Cooper, residents of Gilde, was reported at Mercy hospital today to be recovering from severe burns on the right leg. Fuel oil which had spilled on one leg of the child's overalls was ignited as he was playing with matches. It was reported alone at the time of the accident, he apparently extinguished the blaze by pouring water over himself.

GERMAN NEWSPAPER HAS ALIBI FOR MAX

BERLIN, June 23.—(AP)—Germany took the news hard today that Joe Louis' fists had blasted Max Schmeling's comeback hopes in a little more than two minutes.

Thousands of heavy-lidded Germans sat up to hear a ring-side radio broadcast of the heavyweight championship fight that left them thunder-struck and unbelieving.

Those who did not sit up scarcely believed what they saw in the newspapers.

The newspaper they saw in the newspapers charged "certain American business men" should be blamed for Schmeling's defeat. It said they "hindered the fight to the point where... only a miracle would enable Schmeling to win."

FEDERATION OF LABOR MAY STOP ENDORSING POLITICAL ASPIRANTS

TILLAMOOK, June 23.—(AP)—A recommendation of the Oregon State Federation of Labor not endorse candidates for public office was expected on the floor of the federation convention here late today from the law and legislation committee. The resolution was expected to provoke a heated battle. The resolution was passed 5 to 4 by the committee which agreed to make the action unanimous, obviating a minority report.

The convention this morning, by roll-call vote, approved 119 to 87 the recreation of the bureau of union labels. The bureau director will be financed by diversion of one cent from the seven-cent per capita tax.

Affiliated unions pay seven cents a member as a monthly per capita tax. The federation's receipts last year totaled \$18,539.88.

The convention approved a request for a legislative war chest. The annual report, asked that each union voluntarily contribute 25 cents per member for a legislative fund, the money to be used to fight anti-union bills and initiatives.

POSTMASTERS TOLD TO LET ALIENS OUT

WASHINGTON, June 23.—(AP)—W. W. Howes, first assistant postmaster general, directed all post-

masters today to discharge on June 30 any postoffice employee who is an alien and has not filed his first naturalization papers.

The order was in accordance with provisions of the appropriations act for the postoffice department, passed by congress on March 28. Howes added that Filipinos are not considered aliens, and therefore will not be affected.

RAINS INTERFERE WITH CHINA'S WAR

SHANGHAI, June 23.—(AP)—Heavy rains interfered with hostilities in China today, and advices from Hankow said the Yangtze river overflowed both banks downstream, thereby alleviating a flood threat in the Chinese provincial capital.

At the same time the intended departure next Tuesday of the British ambassador, Sir Archibald John Kerr Clark and the Swedish minister, Baron Johan Beckrius, for Hankow, by way of Hongkong, led to elusive rumors of peace talks.

Both diplomats said their trip was on "routine" business and denied they were carrying mediation proposals.

HUSBAND AND WIFE STAGE OWN SCRAP OVER FIGHT WAGER

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.—(AP)—The bet was for only a dollar, but Mr. and Mrs. Emmond Monroe staged a scrap of their own Policeman Clarence Fella reported today, after the Lolla-Schmelling fight ended so suddenly.

Fella said Mrs. Monroe told him, after neighbors called police: "It's like this, I bet on Louis while Emmond, ordinarily an intelligent man and a good husband, bet on the German."

"And when the Brown Bomber beat him in such slick fashion, why, Emmond was furious at me, not the German, and started to beat me."

Monroe was booked on a charge of being intoxicated.

ARMY AIRMEN KILLED

PRAHA, June 23.—(AP)—Two army aviators were killed today when three military airplanes collided over Praha during maneuvers. The pilot of the third plane saved himself with his parachute.

GRIZZLY PEAK BLAZE CALLS THREE CREWS

Three crews of firefighters were dispatched this afternoon to fight a timber blaze about six miles west of Grizzly Peak. Smoke from the fire could be seen from Medford beyond Roxy Ann.

The blaze was spotted at 1:30 by Francis Hawkins, state forest service lookout at the Soda mountain station. Two crews of nine state firefighters and equipment were dispatched immediately from the district warden's office here. Soon afterward a crew of 25 CCC men left for the fire line.

Extent of the fire could not be ascertained immediately. The blaze was in timber and brush, the district warden's office said.
