

# HARVARD HONORS WALT DISNEY FOR ANIMATED FILMS

Master of Arts Degree Bestowed — Recipient Is Cited As 'Magician'—Canadian Leader Also Cited

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 24.—(AP)—Walter E. Disney, creator of world-famed animated motion picture car-

toon characters, today received a doctor of arts degree from Harvard, America's oldest university, which at the same time honored President Charles Seymour of Yale university, Baron Tweedsmuir, governor general of Canada and 10 others.

It was the second honor bestowed upon Disney in two days by a great educational institution, for Yale similarly recognized his artistry yesterday.

A Magician  
In his citation today, President James Bryant Conant described Disney as "a magician who has created a modern dwelling for the muse. And added, "His hand controls a multitude of elfish animals who charm all humans by their mirth."

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 24.—(AP)—Asserting that Harvard university had been accused of "lurching violently" both to the right and to the left in faculty appointments, President James B. Conant today hit sharply at "pressure groups" in an address in defense of academic independence.

To yield before "threats from any quarter," he told the Harvard Alumni association, would be to "start down the road which ends in lack of freedom."

More recently the appointment of Granville Hicks, a self-declared communist, as a counsellor, drew comment.

"It has been said by some," President Conant declared, "that in one instance an exception to a general policy should have been made since otherwise the public was bound to believe that a teacher was discriminated against because of his alleged radical views and activities."

From Right And Left  
"On the other hand, it has been urged that a certain recent appointment to a minor position was ill-advised because the public mind is today sensitized to certain labels, left or right, from right and from left it is frequently suggested that in a question of an academic appointment what is technically known as the 'press reaction' should be the controlling factor."

of appointment turn on the question of whether or not unfavorable publicity may result in to jeopardize the independence of this ancient institution.

"To me an important aspect of each of the cases to which I have referred was whether or not the university, through the regular constitutional channels, should proceed according to the best judgment of those charged with the responsibility, or whether we should be intimidated by pressure groups from the right or from the left."

"On this fundamental point I can not believe that there can be any dissent by those who examine the issue coolly."

# TOWNSEND PILGRIMS FLOCK TO BIRTHSPOT OF PENSION PROJECT

LONG BEACH, Cal., June 24.—(AP)—Thousands of silver-haired delegates from the third national Townsend convention journeyed like Pilgrims today to Long Beach—birthplace of the Townsend old age pension plan.

They came to the ocean resort where a gaunt country doctor, fired from the city health department, envisioned back in 1933 the time when all over the age of 65 would be given

\$200 a month by the government. As the main sessions of the convention closed in Los Angeles last night, Dr. Francis E. Townsend urged the 6,000 registered delegates to speed the plan into operation. "I am getting old fast, I don't want to wait any 10 years for a consummation of our hopes," he said.

He advocated the founding of Townsend parties in states where nominees do not endorse his pension plan before the November general election. He said organization work must be pushed in "hardly touched" states like Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee and the Carolinas.
