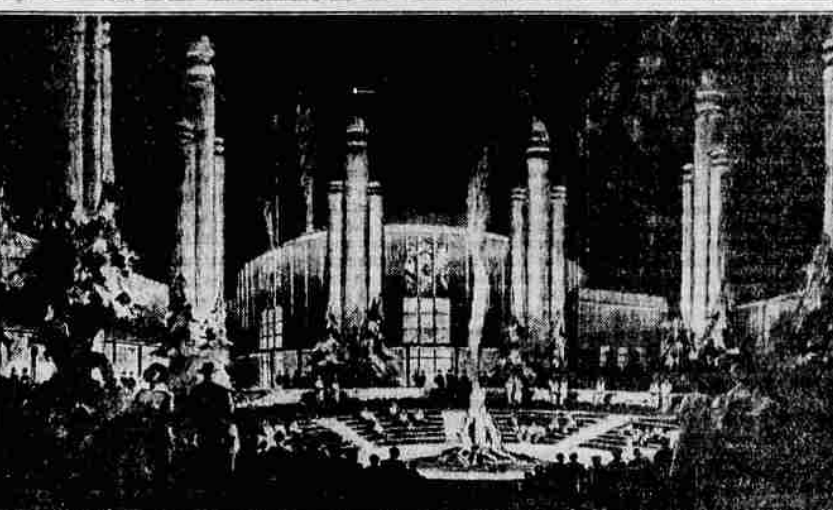
THRASHING OF GRAIN STARTS IN C. P. AREA

EMERGENCY OFFICERS BENEFIT BILL VETOED

WASHINGTON, June 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt has vetoed a bill restoring retirement pay to part of the 4,700 World War emergency officers removed from these benefits by the economy act.

The measure would have continued retirement pay for emergency officers of the army, navy and marine corps who served between April 6, 1917 and November 11, 1918, and incurred "permanent disabilities of 30 per cent or more in line of duty."

CARPENTER UNION OPPOSES MAKING LABEL AN ISSUE

Local Union No. 2067, United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of Medford went on record at a meeting Friday night, as being opposed to declaring all producers of the Rogue River valley "unfair" unless they market their products under the union label.

The carpenters local also went on record as opposing the opening of stores on Sunday. The statement, as authorized at the meeting, follows in full:

"In view of the above, Local Union No. 2067 United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of Medford, an affiliate of the American Federation of Labor, herewith makes clear its stand upon the matter. 'This local will not, at any time, endorse such action. 'Firstly, such a decree is, itself, unfair and illogical, at least until the employees of the producers themselves are organized. 'And secondly, believing that the interests of industry and of labor are ultimately identical, our sole objective is to effect equitable and harmonious relations between them and radical or ill-considered actions will not hasten that desired goal.
