LOS ANGELES, June 28.—Veteran Smead Jolley of Oakland, hitting at a .395 clip, took over leadership in the Pacific Coast league batting race this week with youthful Brooks Holder of San Francisco in second place.

Jolley, who reached the 30-game mark in unofficial figures compiled to date, replaced Marvin Gudat of Los Angeles in the top spot as the latter dropped to a tie with Frenchy Uhalt of Hollywood for fourth at .339.

Holder's average was .360, 18 points better than third-place Johnny Frederick of Portland.

EVANSTON, Ill., June 28.—(AP)—Track and field stars of the Pacific coast conference, with Southern California's great team holding a large share of the honors, boasted a second straight triumph today in their inter-sectional series with representatives of the western conference.

Before 10,000 spectators at North-western university's Dyche stadium, the west coast team swept to a 101 to 35 victory last night.

Two University of Oregon men, George Varoff and Mack Robinson, were leaders in the victory.

Varoff distanced his rivals four inches in the pole vault, leaping 14 feet, 2 inches for first place.

Robinson made a fine stretch run in the 220-yard dash to pick up one point for a third place. He placed second in the broad jump and also in the 220-yard hind hurdles, which he finished behind Earl Hickley.

Not so long ago, just after the whooping baseball deal in which the Chicago Cubs traded three players and a mere \$185,000 to the St. Louis Cardinals for one sore arm, we sat down and pounded out the learned prediction that Curtis Davis was all through with major league baseball. That he was headed for the minor leagues and baseball obscurity.

At the time, our reasoning seemed logical enough. Why, so ran our thought-process, should Mr. Wrigley of Chicago give Mr. Rickety of St. Louis a cool 185 grand, plus Curt Davis and two other players, for one Dizzy Dean, when Davis, a better pitcher than the talkative Dizzy?
